SHOULDER CONDITIONS

IRATE MOTORIST PURSUES HIT, RUN CAR BUT FAILS
Police are still investigating a hit and run accident that occurred at about 6.40 last Friday night at the corner of Mill and Water Sts. Sylvia Lorrman of Glen Williams was driving away from a parking spot opposite the post office when another car proceeding east down the Mill St. Mill overtook the Lorrman car striking it on the left front bumper, and then continuing on up Water Street. Miss Lorrman drove after the hit and run car with horn honking but the other driver did not stop. Mud on the rear plate of the car made the license numbers unreadable. Thirty-five dollars was the estimated total damage in the accident investigated by Cpl. Jim Hildebrand.
