Aside from the local achievement day, this Awards Night constitutes the highlight of our 4-H Club Year," stated Wm. C. Robinson of Oakville R. R. 1, who ably extended the thanks of the club members to their interest and support to the donors and others who contribute to the success of the 4-H Program. The high school auditorium at Milton, on Friday, November 1st, was packed for the occasion, by the 4-H's, their parents, and friends. It was an outstanding night's program which was run off under the joint direction of A. T. Woodley, chairman of the Halton's 4-H Club Leaders' Council, and associate ag. rep. J. Allen Francis. Miss Joan Wrigglesworth of Hornby, one of the four Ontario Junior Farmer delegates to Great Britain, in 1957 was the special speaker. Miss Wrigglesworth, who was introduced by Evelyn McKay, of Georgetown, presented a most interesting and informal illustrated address which enthralled her large audience. John Black of Moffat, in extending the appreciation of the gathering, referred to the fact that Joan received her trip overseas as a result of her activity in 4-H and Junior Farmer activities. Miss Barbara Cunningham of Ashgrove, another former 4-H'er and still active Junior Farmer officer as usual delighted her audience with her vocal selections, as did Nora Beaty of Omagh, with her instrumental.

It was, as in former years, an inspiring occasion to see and hear the young people of Halton playing their respective roles. Numbered among the "seniors" who spoke briefly were Warden Thomas Millward of Broiler, and Reeve John Milne, chairman of the Halton County Council committee on Agriculture and Reforestation.

Guests from outside the county included Ed Warriner, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Kingsway Kiwanis, who annually donate a short course Scholarship to one member of each 4-H Club — their contributions this year total \$150, and will be presented at a special luncheon at the "Old Mill" in Toronto on December 16th — where the twelve fortunate Halton 4-H's will be special guests.

The special award to the 4-H Club with the highest percentage of completion and attendance at meetings was won by Halton's 2nd Year Grain Club, led by John W. Pickett. The Halton 4-H Pétato Club and the Acton 4-H Grain Club were also successful in having 100 per cent competitions. Another of the many features worthy of mention was the presentation by chairman "Add" Woodley, of the Farmers' Magazine trophy to Wm. C. Robinson and Lynne Coulter, Halton's Champion Beef team which won provincial honours at the Provincial Inter-Club Competitions held at Guelph the week previous.

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Royal Winter Fair Opens This Friday

Millions of dollars worth of prized livestock, horses and farm produce from a number of countries throughout the world will be exhibited at the 1957 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, the world's largest indoor agricultural exhibition, scheduled to be held in the Coliseum in Toronto from Nov. 15th to 23rd.

Each of Canada's ten provinces will again be well represented in this year's Royal which, as in other years, will have the pick of herds, fields and orchards on display. This has been designated as "International year" and show officials in charge of entries report that there will be more exhibits, more judges and more trophies than ever before from foreign nations.

Official opening ceremonies will be performed by the Prime Minister, the Hon. John D. Diefenbaker, while His Worship Mayor Nathan Phillips of Toronto will extend a welcome to teams from Great Britain, Ireland, the United States, Mexico, Argentina, Chile and Canada that will compete in the International Jumping Competitions.

More than 130 internationally famous judges from three different nations will have the difficult task of picking prize winning entries from among the thousands on display. Winners will be presented with trophies and cups valued at more than \$35,000, four miles of ribbons and rosettes and cash totalling in excess of \$135,000.

Among distinguished guests who will be in attendance at the 1957 Royal will be the Duke of Beaufort, Gloucestershire, England, Master of the Horse to Her Majesty the Queen, Lt. Col. M. P. Ansell, London, England, Honorary Director of the British Horse Society, His Excellency the Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Governor General of Canada, and the Hon. Louis O. Breithaupt, Lieutenant-governor of Ontario.

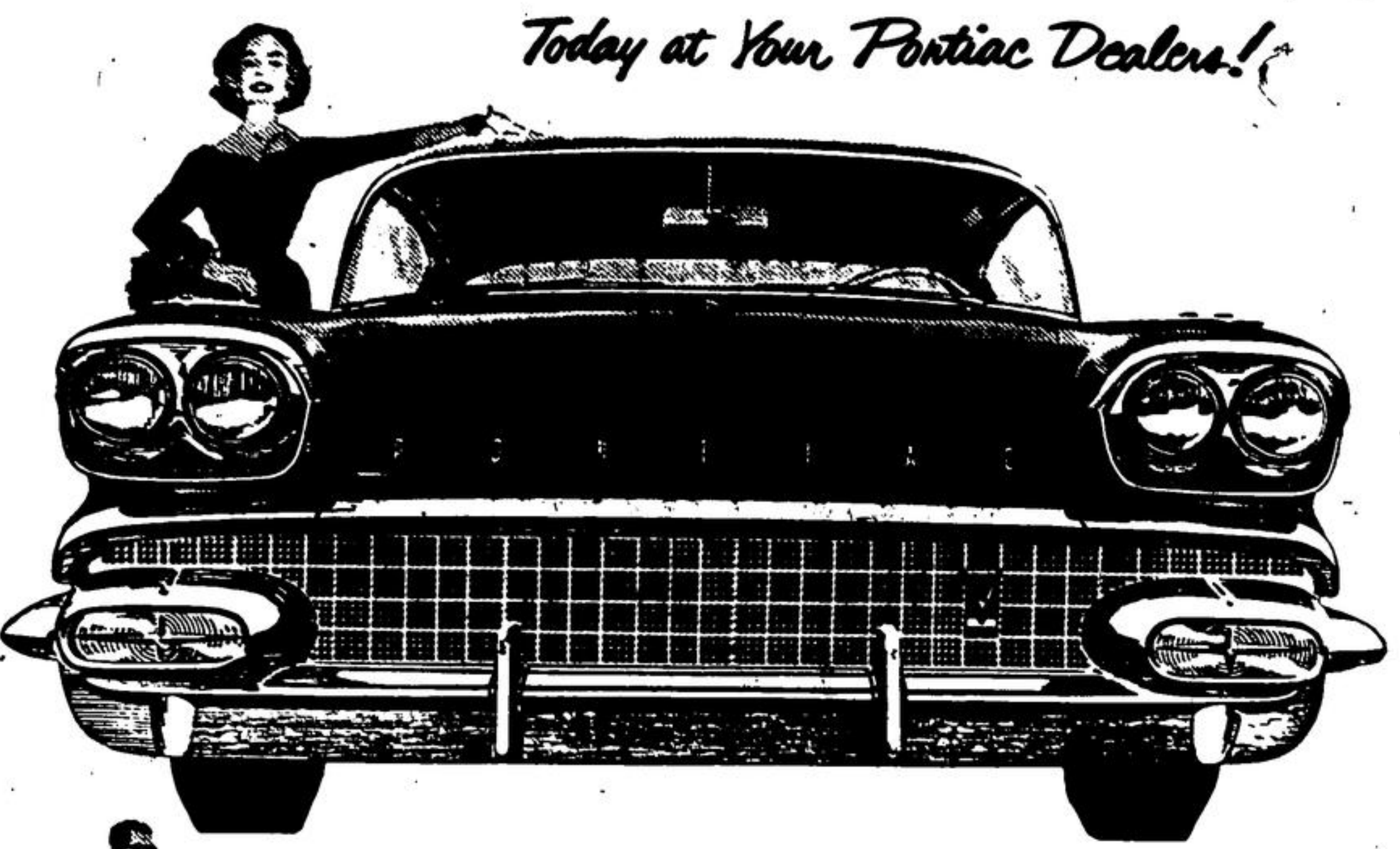

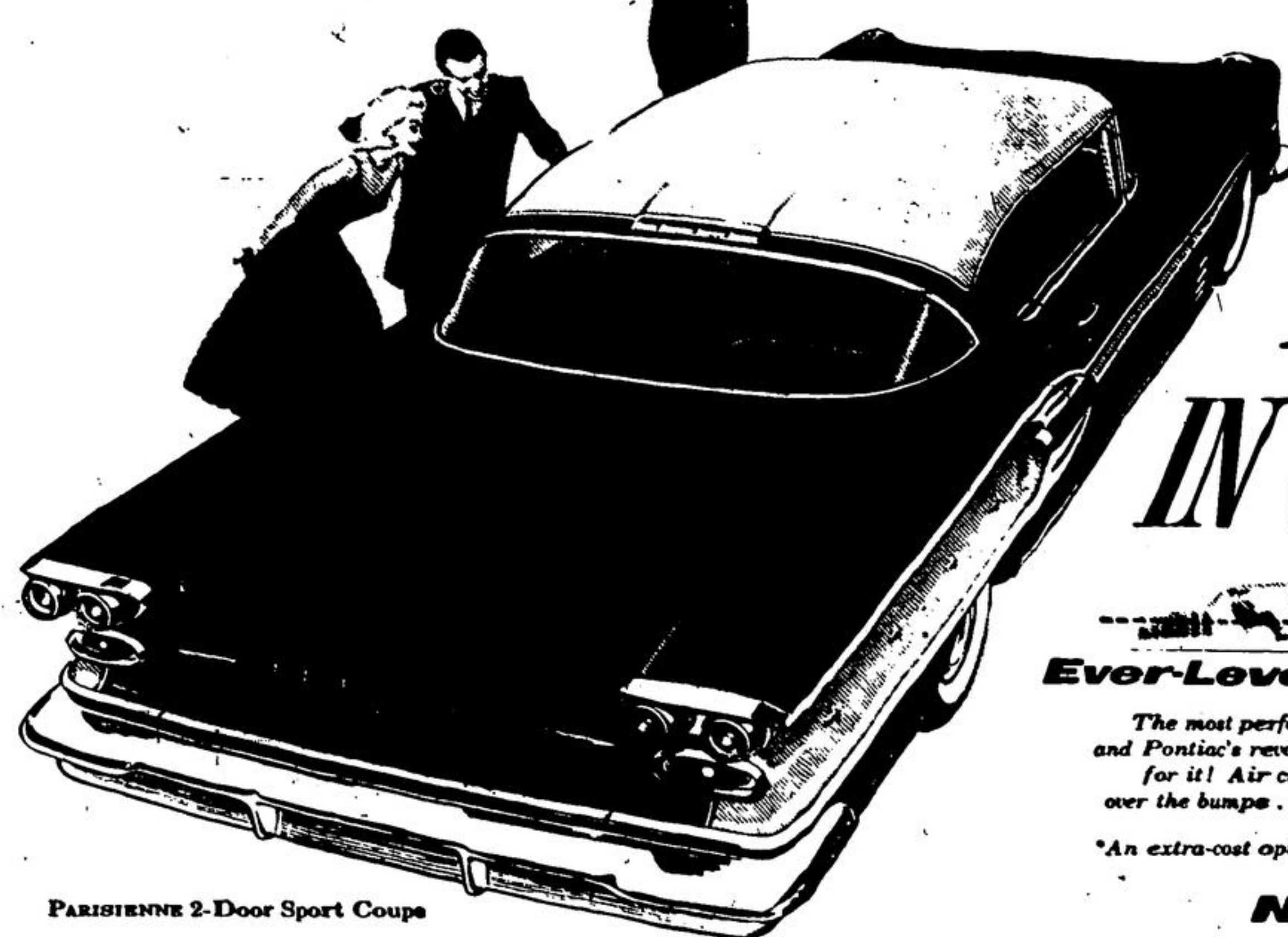
