Enrolment Over 200, Glen Adds Sixth Classroom

Population growth in Glen Williams has boosted school enrolment over the 200 mark and the town hall is again being used as a classroom.

The school expanded from its previous five classrooms last week when Mr. Thomas Darcie joined the staff and commenced teaching a combined Grade 4 and 5 class in the new location. The town hall had previously been used until a 3-room addition was made to the school a few years ago. There are 32 pupils in the new class.

No decision has been made yet by the board of Esquimes School Area which administers the Glen school and future plans will depend on the rate of growth of the district served by the school.

The new staff member comes from Waterloo, is married and father of two children. Other members of the school staff are Principal Ralph McKeown, Mrs. Edna Beaumont, Miss Hilda Boyes, Miss Gail Wheeler and Miss Carol Underhill.

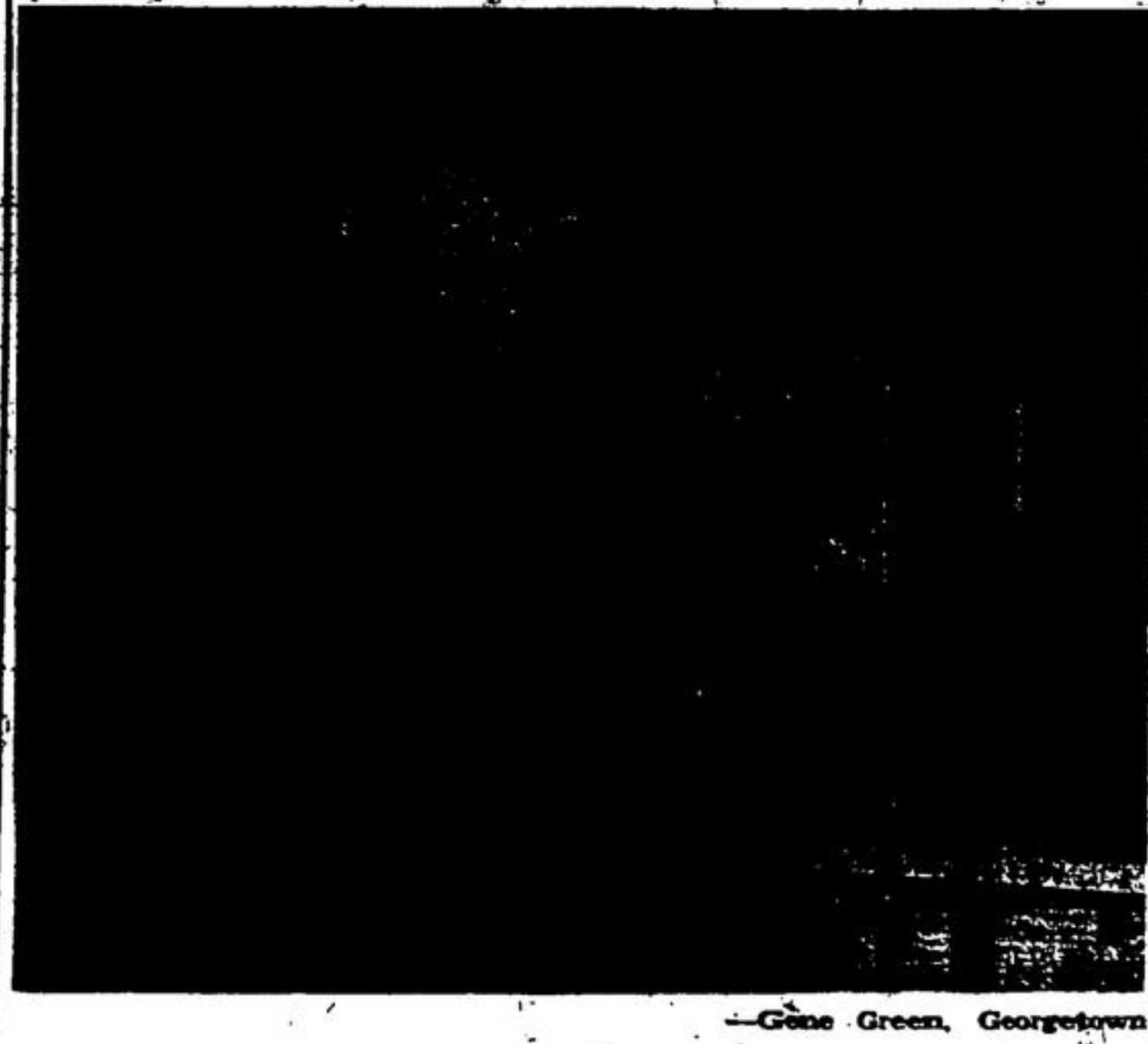

William J. Blake, father of Marjorie (Mrs. Frank Wilson) Georgetown, G. Roy of Woodbridge and Sherman of Goderich, died at the Flynn Nursing Home, Acton, on Wednesday, November 13th in his eighty-seventh year. Mr. Blake had been in failing health for some time.

The son of George and Katherine Thompson Blake, he was born and raised near Woodbridge where he lived all his life. He and Harriet Topper were married on December 15th, 1897 in Woodbridge. For several years Mr. Blake was a market gardener, later turning to construction and cement work.

Mr. Blake was a member of the United Church and sang in the choir for many years. He was very fond of music and was a member of the Woodbridge band. He was also secretary of the Board of Education for twenty-five years.

He was predeceased by his wife ten years ago and leaves his daughter, two sons and a sister Mrs. H. H. Smith of Detroit, Michigan, and five grandchildren.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Proposal of Builders Approved in Principle

Approval "in principle" of the plan of North Halton Builders' Association to promote industrial and commercial building through formation of a stock company, was given by council on Monday.

Council, however, gave no commitment that it would consider releasing more land in the Delrex area for house building without further study of the plan proposed by the builders' group.

While a unanimous vote recorded the approval, at least three council members spoke their doubts about land releases at the present time.

Reeve Allen said there were several questions he would like answered before agreeing to any such proposal.

Cr. Fred Harrison said he was not in a position to either support or turn down the proposition without further information.

A similar view was expressed by Cr. Alfred Sykes, who said that he did not agree with the mechanics of the proposal, but that he is willing to negotiate with the builders to see what can be arrived at.

Cr. Ern Hyde reported the planting of 17 trees in Swanek subdivision, first action on a plan to move trees from the old road.

"Go Forth in His Name" was the timely subject chosen by Rev. Morgan McFarlane for his sermon at St. John's United Sunday morning.

SEEK TUESDAY WIN AS RAIDERS LOSE THREE GAMES

Milton Intermediates Defeat Jr. Raiders 7-2

Despite coming out five goals down in their exhibition tilt with the Milton Intermediates last night the Junior Raiders turned in a better game than the one here a week ago when they skated Bolton-Intermediates into a five all tie.

Last night Milton was the club with the wings on their skates as speed turned out to be the big difference between winning and losing. More than one Milton goal resulted from Georgetown being out-raced to the puck.

None of the three Georgetown lines could be tagged weak on the night's play. The starting trio of Dance, Harrison, and Doug Richardson didn't have to carry any more than their share of the load as they did in the Bolton game giving coach Bill Chard a chance to ice his other two lines without losing too much punch.

Turner has been dropped back with Cunningham and Pomeroy in the slot held by Ken Richardson last year to convert the CPR line to the new high octane line (TCP) and that's just the way they played especially in the early minutes of the second session when they bottled Milton up in their own end; the only time Georgetown was able to do it with the teams at full strength. THREE ACCIDENTS ON NO. 7 HIGHWAY STRETCH

The OPP detachment at Milton reports three accidents on No. 7 highway west of here during the past week.

Constable Hazlett was the officer called to investigate one at Pensioners Corner on Thursday. Damage was \$100 to a car driven by Charles Sheppard of Terra Cotta and \$200 to a panel truck driven by Oscar Warner of Toronto. There were no injuries.

OPEN NIGHT AT SCHOOLS

Parents met the teachers at open nights Monday at Chapel St. and Wrigglesworth public schools, and had an opportunity to discuss their children's progress.

Decision will be made within the next ten days by a company which is considering locating on a 20 to 30 acre site in Delrex.

The company has narrowed its choice to Georgetown and one other location according to Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent, who reported to council at Monday's meeting. Primarily concerned with sewage disposal, council gave assurance that this could be handled. While the new disposal plant will not be ready for the projected June opening date of the firm, Mr. Sargent said that the Delrex firm has contacted the Ontario health department and has been assured that it will okay temporary disposal facilities.

Mr. Sargent said he has no hint of the firm name or its product, as discussions have taken place with a consulting engineer representing the firm.

"I understand that it's a reputable firm, and it could be the key that will get the industrial ball rolling" said Reeve Stan Allen.

Council decided that the \$830,000 disposal plant, which will be financed by the Ontario Water Resources Commission, will be paid for by a 5 mill slice of the general tax rate, plus a service rate to consumers based on outlets.

As the assessment grows, the mayor explained, the service rate will lower until at a certain point the entire yearly \$86,000 cost might be taken care of in the tax rate.

"I'm not too optimistic about seeing an end to a service charge" said Cr. Alfred Sykes. "If we have a big assessment increase, there will be extensions to the disposal plant too."

Mr. Syke, however, agreed with other councillors that the system will be the fairest to adopt and it will be the method of payment.
