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Hospital Board Seeks Help From M.P.P. in Queries

On Thursday, November 14, the members of the Georgetown Hospital Association discussed with Mr. Stanley Hall, M.P.P. for Halton, the need for a hospital in the north Halton area.

It was pointed out to Mr. Hall that thus far little satisfaction has been obtained from the Ontario Hospital Services Commission as to a date when approval will be given for a hospital to serve this area. The Association is trying to obtain from the Commission, the body which has authority to approve all new hospital construction in this province, assurance that approval will be given, within a reasonable time, provided the Association can furnish proof that it has raised the funds necessary to build the hospital. In view of the \$8,000 per bed grant approved by the county, along with Federal and Provincial grants and the possibility of other substantial grants, the Association is confident it can raise the balance.

Mr. Hall agreed with the increasing need for a hospital here and stated that the Commission should provide the association with a more satisfactory answer to its request than has been obtained thus far. He volunteered to obtain the answer sought by the association as soon as possible.

Also present at the meeting were Doctors J. H. Chamberlain, Alistair Macintosh, Alan Thompson and Ormond Brewster who prepared a signed statement for Mr. Hall to the effect that they felt a hospital was urgently needed here, contrary to statements attributed to them in the Agnew report. The latter was prepared by a firm of hospital consultants to County Council after a survey of hospital needs in Halton County. It is felt that this report has been influential in decisions made by the Commission regarding hospital construction in this county, and has adversely affected the efforts of the Georgetown group.

With the support of Mr. Hall, the Association feels it can expect more favourable treatment from the Hospital Services Commission.

Sign Agreements for Township Fire Coverage

Fire protection in Esquensing Township has been taken care of in agreements signed recently by the township council with a group of municipalities in the Milton and Acton districts.

The township has agreed with Milton, Nassagaweya, Nelson and Trafalgar to share in a new fire area which will operate under a committee appointed by these municipalities. Costs will be shared on an assessment basis for the district involved.

Another agreement has been signed with Acton, Erin and Nassagaweya in which Esquensing agrees to purchase a fire truck which will be housed and manned in Acton, and pay \$100 for each fire call answered by the Acton fire department in the township.

The township is continuing an agreement with Georgetown made some time ago, by which a yearly fee of \$500 is paid plus \$50 a fire call. Georgetown already has a fire engine which the township purchased a few years ago.

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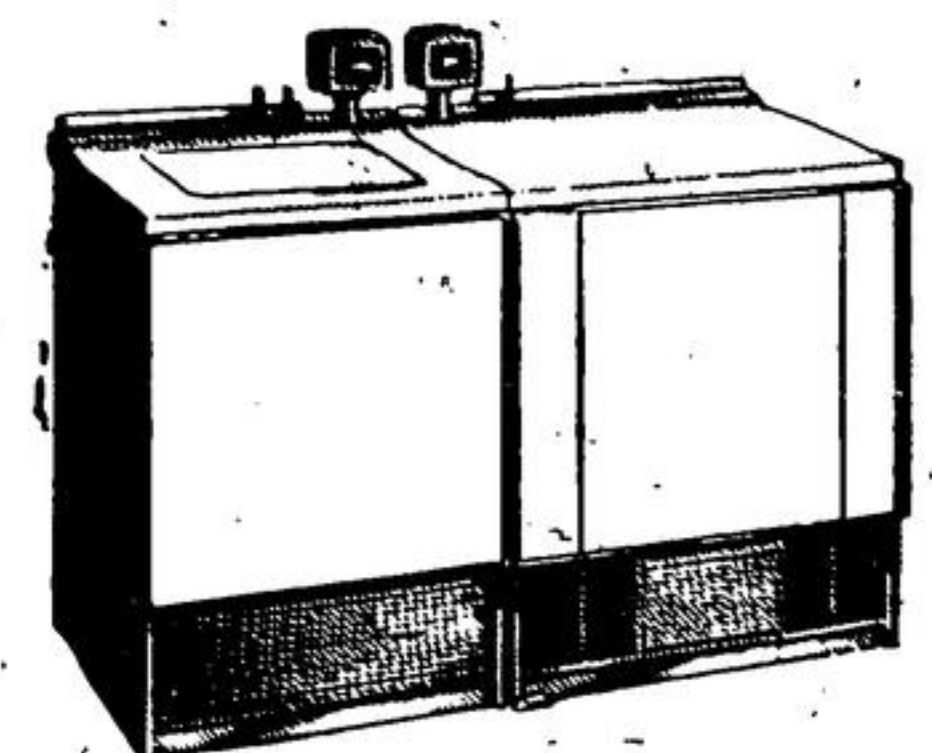
