### Glen Man President, Anglican Deanery, BAC

William Korzack, Glen Williams  
was chosen president of the Bro-  
therhood of Anglican Churchmen  
in the deanery when members  
met for dinner at Milton on Thurs-  
day.

Mr. Korzack succeeds Hamilton  
Smith, Oakville. Duncan McTavish,  
Oakville was elected vice-presi-  
dent and Jack Meades, Georgetown,  
secretary-treasurer.

The business meeting followed  
dinner served by ladies of Grace  
Anglican Church. Dr. Robert  
Buckner, Acton, who is psychia-  
trist at the Ontario Reformatory,  
Guelph, spoke on the need for  
a more intelligent system of  
dealing with young men who have  
broken the law, and urged the  
type of treatment for prisoners  
that is now given for mental pa-  
tients in hospitals.

The church should take an in-  
terest in what happens to crim-  
inals, and it is a form of mission-  
ary work, he said, to do so. Can-  
ada would be better off morally  
and financially if changes are

of rehabilitation adopted, he said.
