

Seek \$4500 in April Cancer Society Canvass

A \$4500 objective has been set for the April campaign of North Halton Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society.

The unit, formed last year, comprises all the territory north of the Dundas Highway, with Georgetown, Acton and Milton being the main centres of general meetings. Meetings are planned for every second Thursday of each month throughout the year, and interested persons are asked to attend these meetings.

An all meeting Thursday in the municipal building, Georgetown, a tentative slate of officers was suggested for 1958, as follows: Peter McWilliams, Milton, president; Aldo Braida, Acton, 1st vice-president; Douglas Latimer, Georgetown, 2nd vice-president; R. M. Clements, Milton, treasurer; education committee, Dr. Alistair Macintosh, Georgetown, Dr. A. T. Hunter and Clayton Jubb, Milton; campaign committee, Ernie Alcott, Georgetown, chairman, James Carney and Reg Broomhead, Georgetown; service committee, Mrs. G. F. Thompson, Milton, chairman, Mrs. Ernie Alcott, Georgetown, Mrs. West, Acton.

A secretary is to be appointed at the next meeting to replace the present secretary, Ernie Alcott, enabling Mr. Alcott to give full-time effort on the 1958 campaign.

At the meeting, Mr. McWilliams related the activities of the education committee, outlining the activities of film showing and speeches on the fight against cancer. Invitations for these showings were accepted from various organizations in the three towns and numerous villages. The films are available for any meeting in Halton by contacting Mr. McWilliams or Mr. Alcott, allowing two weeks' notice for procuring them. The unit is indebted to Mr. Bainbridge of Milton for offering rooms at Milton Building Supplies for the service committee to make dressings for patients and storage of these dressings. Transportation of patients was supplied on various occasions to Hamilton and Toronto. Anyone who would like to offer transportation to these centres should contact himself or Mr. Alcott, Mr. McWilliams said.

A report on service work was read from Mrs. G. F. Thompson, stating the principles of this active branch of the unit. Duties of the committee are to prepare and distribute dressings for cancer patients, take gifts to them and in general make patients as comfortable as possible, supply transportation to clinics for treatment, and whenever needed, to care for patients and families at home. The next general meeting is planned for Acton on December 12th.

WATER RESOURCES BOARD HAS WATER, SEWER PROJECTS

A water supply project for Winchester, in eastern Ontario, has been approved by the Ontario Water Resources Commission. Cost has been estimated at close to \$250,000. In making the announcement, chairman A. M. Snider of the OWRC said test drilling seeking an adequate ground supply of water would get underway immediately. Once an adequate supply has been proven tenders for construction of the system will be called.

Mr. Snider said the Winchester project was most urgent in view of the fact that the existing water situation in the village creates a serious problem.

The Commission chairman added that the Commission now has under construction or approaching the construction stage 10 water and six sewage projects. The 10 water projects involved are at Bancroft, Rock Township (Sunderland), Dresden, Frankford, Harrow, Havelock, Markham Township, Port Perry, Richmond Hill and Winchester. The sewage projects involve Bancroft, Richmond Hill, Stratford, Streetsville, Toronto Township and Trenton.

The OWRC, he said, expected to have approximately \$20,000,000 worth of works under agreement soon. An \$830,000 sewage disposal plant for Georgetown is also in prospect for the OWRC. Council recently gave first readings to a by-law asking for financing aid for the projected system here.

Katherine Merry Is Top Halton Public Speaker

"There has been more debating and public speaking talent displayed here tonight than on any previous occasion," stated George E. Elliott, Q.C., of Milton, who spoke on behalf of the judging panel at the conclusion of the Halton Juniors' annual inter-club debating and public speaking competitions held in the Milton High School on November 8th.

Eight young people participated in the two inter-club debates and three in the public speaking. Katherine Merry of the Milton Juniors was the unanimous choice of the panel of judges as the top speaker in the public speaking competition. Mildred Watson of Acton Juniors and Jack Loos of the Palermo Juniors were the other two contestants. Each contestant after delivering a ten minute prepared address, then had ten minutes to prepare for his or her three minute impromptu. It was a test which many "oldsters" would hesitate to tackle but all three young people came through with flying colours.

Miss Merry will now represent Halton Juniors in the inter-county public speaking competition scheduled for Toronto in early January. **Farm Independence**
"Resolved that Farm People are losing their independence" was the topic of the two debates. Acton Juniors entered the two affirmative teams. In the first debate Acton was represented by Sandy Buchanan and Patricia Hitching, and their negative opponents were Jean Peterson and Barbara Tasker of the Milton Club.

The second debate brought together Mildred Watson and Don Moffat of Acton, against the Norval negative of Barbara Cunningham and Jean Bird. While the two negative teams from Milton and Norval respectively, secured the decision of the judges, it was a split decision in both cases, which indicates that all eight young people did an outstanding job. Halton Juniors were fortunate in having as their panel of judges Mrs. L. C. McQuat of Milton; W. E. Breckon of Burlington and George E. Elliott, Q.C., of Milton. The most difficult task confronting the judges was to select the four young people who will carry the flag for Halton in the 1957-1958 inter-county debating series.

At the outset the judges were far from unanimous but in the final analysis, four young ladies got the nod, namely, the Misses Jean Bird, Barbara Cunningham, Jean Peterson and Mildred Watson. This quartette will tackle Wellington County in the first round, and the date has been set for Tuesday, November 26th. Halton's negative team of Barbara Cunningham and Jean Peterson will meet the Wellington affirmative team at the Court House in Milton, while Halton's affirmative team of Jean Bird and Mildred Watson, will journey to Fergus to lock horns with the Wellington's negative.

Ontario's Farm Marketing Plans as they effect the farmers' independence are likely to play a large part in both debates, inasmuch as Halton and Ontario farmers will face a vote on a wheat marketing plan on December 9th, and likely a vote on the Hog Marketing Plan next spring, we think our senior folk would be well advised to take advantage of the opportunity of hearing the subject discussed.

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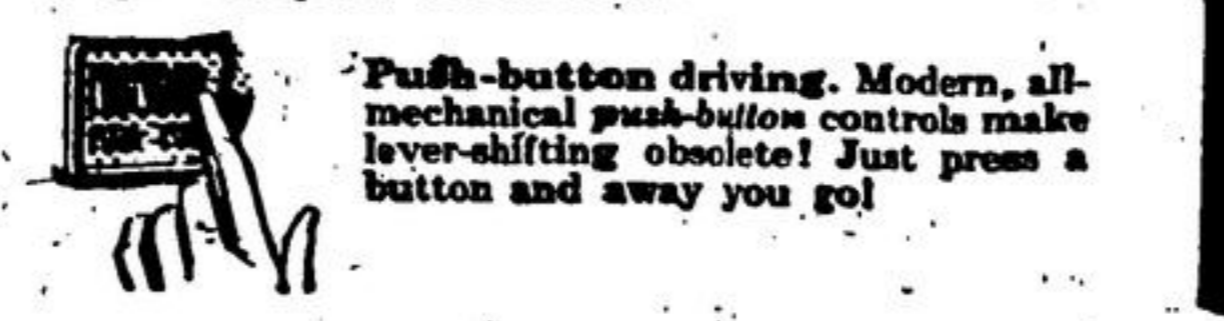
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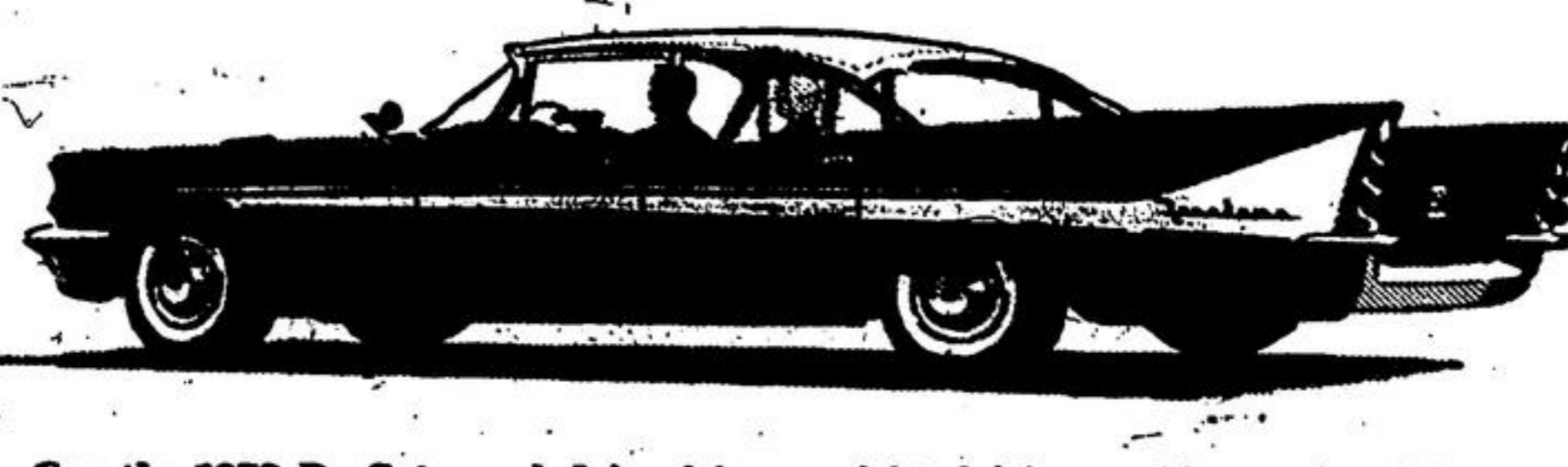
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
