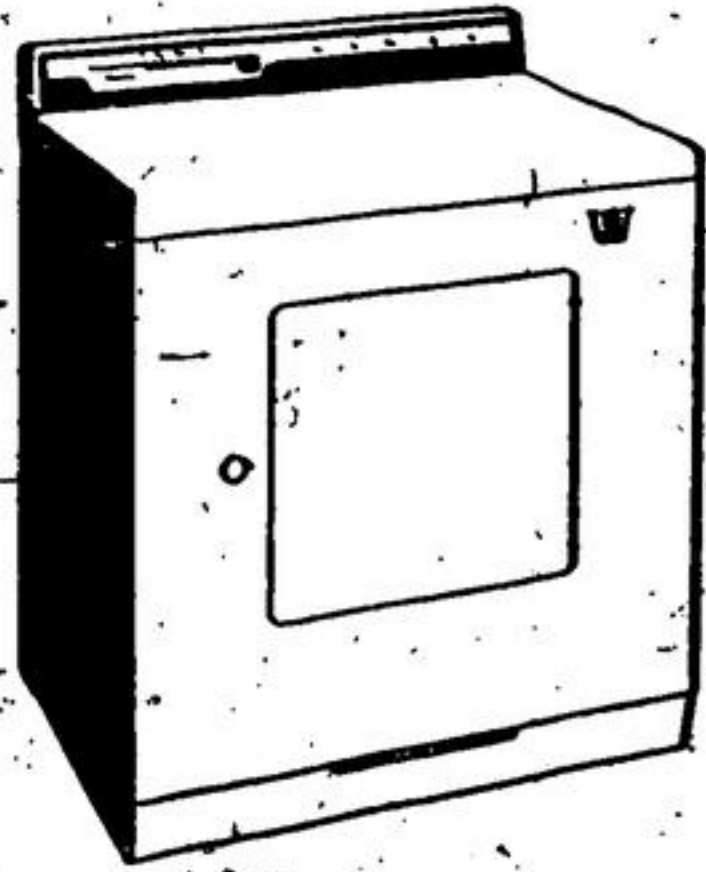

Three Accidents Occur Between Town and Acton

Two westbound vehicles collided on No. 7 Highway during a wind storm last Saturday night at about 6.45 p.m. The drivers, Constantine Schakiel of Main Street North and Richard DeBoer also of Main St. North were uninjured in the crash. Mr. DeBoer was driving a Volkswagen van, owned by Wigo TV and Mr. Schakiel a '53 Chev.

Approximately \$200 damage was sustained by each vehicle in the crash which occurred opposite the Cedar Springs Motel. Cst. Ray Anderson of the Milton detachment OPP investigated.

Another accident occurred earlier the same day at Penon's corner involving a truck owned by Martin Sodding and driven by Tom Ford, Victoria Crescent, and a car driven by Richard Early, Byron St. Damage in this one amounted to about \$350. Cst. Hazlett of the Milton detachment OPP investigated the accident which occurred around 1 p.m.

On Thursday, Nov. 21st, Cst. Anderson investigated an accident in front of Ballantines' Service Station on No. 7 Highway near the Cedar Springs Motel. The driver of the car which struck a hydro pole was Mrs. Matilda Jank of Guelph Street, Acton.

The mishap occurred at about 2.55 p.m. and resulted in \$200 damage to the Jank car.
