Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Ollivier and their family of 44 Prince Charles Drive attended the funeral of his brother, H. Graham Ollivier, on Wednesday, November 13th.

Mr. Ollivier, a native of Guernsey, Channel Islands, came to Toronto in 1907 with his parents John James and Louise Ann Bonnel Ollivier and his brothers and sisters. He has lived in the Toronto-Newmarket district ever since that time with the exception of the time with the exception of the time serving with the Royal Engineers and has been a pensioner since that time having sustained injuries that made him unable to work. Although he had been in poor health for many years, his death came suddenly in Sunnybrook Hospital on Sunday, November 10th.

CIVIC AFFAIRS TOPIC BY SPEAKER AT B&P
