Plan Harrison Public School Addition for Next September

A statement by the inspector for public schools, Mr. Lorne Skuce at a special meeting of the Georgetown public school board in the Harrison public school on Thursday to the effect that the portable classrooms being considered by the board for Harrison are only a temporary solution to a problem that could go on for the next ten years, brought a motion from the board that the necessary steps be taken immediately to start plans for a new four and possibly six room wing on the school. The wing would cost approximately \$60,000.00.

The problem was brought to a head at the meeting when a survey report distributed to board members indicated that Harrison School was absorbing an average 15 pupils per month and at this rate could continue to do so only until January, or by taking over the suggested quota of 35 pupils per room until March. For the remaining 4 months the board must decide whether to return briefly to staggered classes or drop Kindergarten to provide another standard classroom. Regular classes would resume with the fall term and the opening of the new wing.

Only minor changes were made in the sketch plan of the proposed Park School following an inspection of the plan by Mr. Skuce and Mr. Bornholt representing the Department of Education. The changes were made in the height of the ceiling, placement of doors and size of the Kindergarten room.

Miss Diana Wills was engaged as a teacher at Chapel Street School in place of Mrs. Vera Bull who is leaving the staff in December.

Seeks Trade Unionists Interest in Politics

Speaking of the future of organized labour, Reg. Gisborn, M.P.P. for Wentworth East told the regular meeting of Halton CCF Association, held in Milton on Monday that on the labour front the trade union movement must seek to organize the unorganized. Politically, he told his audience, trade unionists must back up their unions by taking an active interest in politics.

Mr. Gisborn said it is cheaper, and easier for workers to gain a fairer share of what they produce by political means and legislative action than it is by strikes. He said three provincial labour federations, Ontario, Saskatchewan and British Columbia have endorsed the CCF as their political arm and predicted more will follow, with similar action being taken by the Canadian Labour Congress.

George Fenton, who is running for an Oakville council seat, addressed the meeting briefly to explain why he is a council candidate.

Jack Henry, federal candidate, chaired the meeting and handled the discussion following Mr. Gisborn's talk. Reports of committees were adopted and members were urged to attend the 25th anniversary celebration of the CCF in Hamilton December 4th at the Delta Collegiate. Stanley Knowles will be the speaker and entertainment will be supplied by CBC-TV artists.

Also quite a number of volunteer ladies are still needed that day to help in various ways, such as showing the public where to hang their coats, welcoming them at the door, and showing them to the various beds. Anyone who feels they can help, are urged to get in touch with one of the above.

It is hoped that this appeal will be extremely successful, in view of the fact that one has not been held in Georgetown in many years.

Deer Breaks Neck In Run on Hill

Retired Banker Bill Glenney Dies

Finance chairman of Brampton council, W. E. (Bill) Glenney, 68 died in Peel Memorial Hospital on November 16th.

A civic-minded man, Mr. Glenney took a prominent part in many of Brampton's charitable and development projects. He served on the public library board for many years and for 17 years had been a member of the Peel Memorial Hospital board of governors. He had been a council member for three years.

Mr. Glenney was born and educated in Oshawa. He was employed in bank branches in Oshawa, Montreal and Seaford and managed branches at Gravenhurst and Huntsville before coming to Brampton as manager of the Toronto-Dominion Bank. He retired four years ago.

Rev. C. Allan Johnson conducted the funeral service at Christ Anglican Church and interment was in Brampton Cemetery.
