# Plan Harrison Public School Addition for Next September

A statement by the inspector for public schools, Mr. Lorne Skuce at Seeks Trade Unionists town public school board in the Interest in Politics Harrison public school on Thursday to the effect that the portable class rooms being considered by the board for Harrison are only temporary solution to a problem that could go on for the next ten years, brought a motion from the board that the necessary steps be taken immediately to start plans for a new four and possibly six room wing on the school. The wing would cost approximately,

\$60,000.00. Regular classes would resume with the fall term and the opening of the new wing.
