HALTON SPORTSMEN WOULD REVISE LICENSING SYSTEM

Halton Sportsmen's Association met at the United Steel Workers' Hall, Milton, for the regular monthly meeting. President Ed Adamson presided.

Carling's Conservation Club presented two fine films, "The Life of the Bee" and "A World in the Marsh." These pictures of nature and wild life depicted a lot of unusual activities and growth of various animals and insects.

Lunch and coffee were served, followed by a short business meeting. A report was given by Art Charlton, hunting director, on the arrangement of a Turkey Shoot to be held Saturday, December 14 at Gordon Lee's farm, Hornby.

A discussion was held regarding the issuing of township hunting licences and the fees. This resulted in the adoption of a resolution to be drafted to the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters that a general revision of the system regulating township licences be considered.

* (1) That residents of town within the county be considered residents; (2) That resident licence fees be not less than one dollar; (3) that 50 per cent of licence revenue be earmarked for conservation and restocking; (4) a fund be set up out of remaining revenue to reimburse property owners for damage by unknown hunters.

The members agreed that the Association join the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, which is a union of different conservation and sport clubs at an annual membership fee of 50c per member.

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UNITED CO-OPS BUY CREAMERY IN PERTH

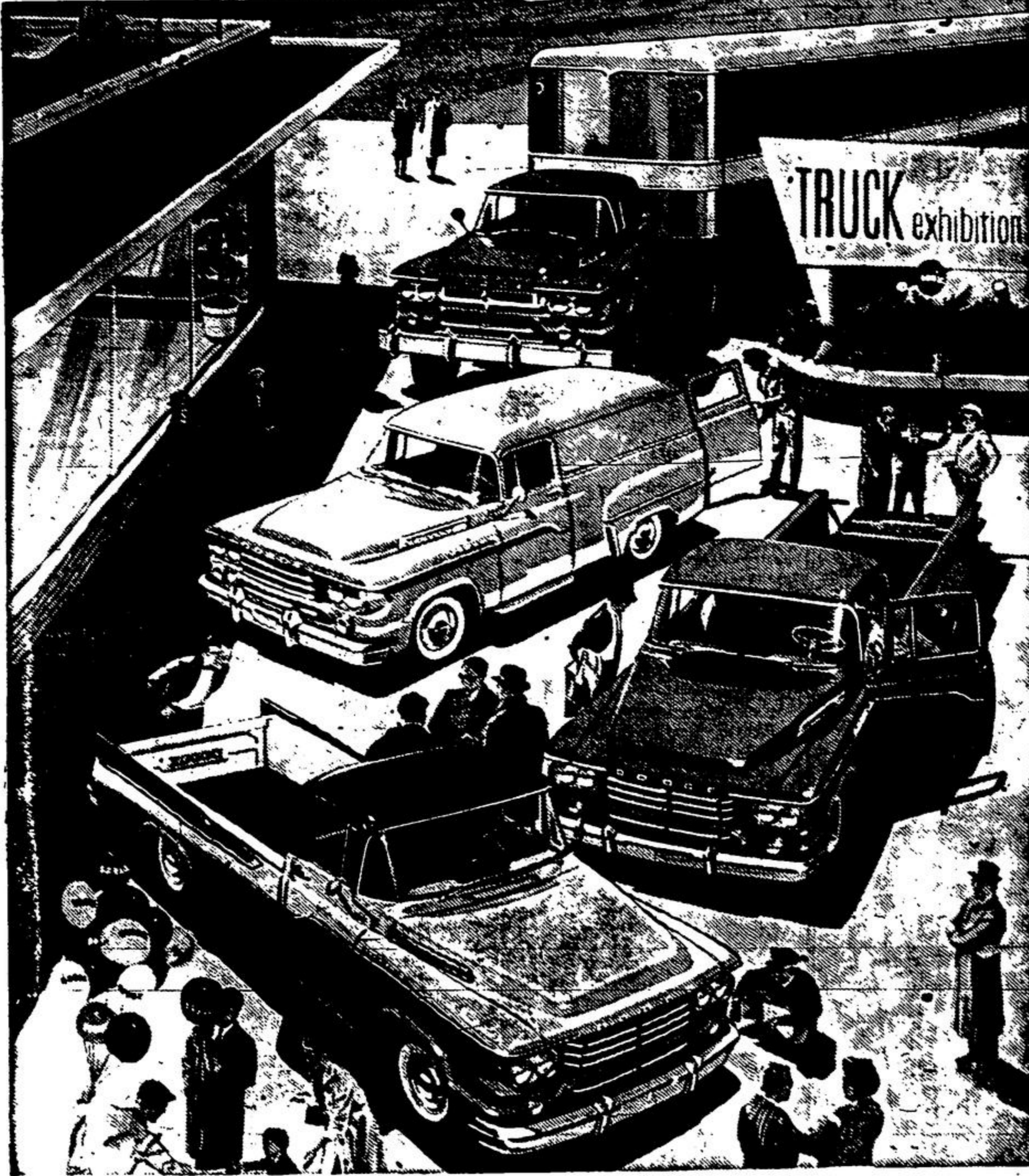
Purchase by United Co-Operatives of Ontario of the Land-O-Lark Creamery in Perth, with a rated annual capacity of 1,000,000 lbs. of butter is announced by Mr. Art Musgrave, president of UCO.

Purchase of the Perth Creamery brings UCO's annual butter production in eastern Ontario up to 21 million pounds annually. This is approximately 20 per cent of the total butter production in Eastern Ontario and makes United Co-Operatives the largest single producer of butter in that area. In all of Ontario, United Co-Operatives produces approximately 25 per cent of the province's annual butter production.

United Co-Operatives present eastern Ontario milk and creamery operations are at Renfrew, Cobden, and Arnprior. Those three plants along with the newly purchased Perth plant will be placed under the management of Mr. Jack Finnegan, former owner of the Perth plant. When arrangements are completed it is planned that Mr. Finnegan will manager UCO's 4 eastern creamery branches from Perth.

The Advisory Board of Directors, which now assists United Co-Operatives in its management of the combined operations at Renfrew, Cobden, and Arnprior will be enlarged to include representatives of producers in the Perth area, Mr. Musgrave said.

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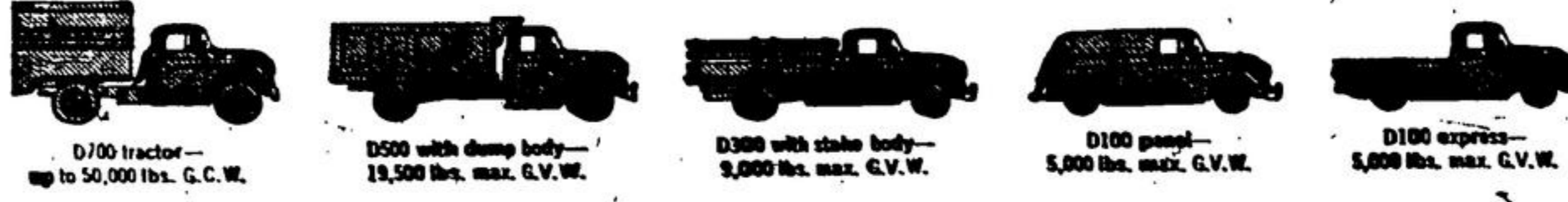
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
