## Stress Civil Defense Role For Lorne Scots Regiment

The new role for the Lorne Scots (P.D. & H. Regt.) in this era of atomic war threat was outlined in its broader aspects on Sunday morning, by Lt. Col. S. R. Charters at a conference of the regiment's officers at the Brampton Armoury.

The fact that nuclear weapons could be launched against Canada tomorrow was sufficient reason for the regiment to give its most enthusiastic support to civil defence preparation.

"There is no need for contracting the blues and certainly no need for panic," declared Col. Charters, "but there is a real need to accept the fact that the militia must prepare itself for a new concept of warfare."

He said that while military training would not be neglected, a large portion of the future syllabus, scheduled for 1958, would embody thorough training in all phases of civil defence.

He urged the closest cooperation with civilian civil defence groups, and welcomed the news that Toronto Township fire chief Jack Braithwaite had been appointed Peel's civil defence co-ordinator. Already he and Major E. F. Conover have extended the regiment's offer of full cooperation.

In the event of atomic war on the Canadian scene, a much greater degree of militia discipline is indicated, for without such discipline and efficiency, a disorganized civilian population would throw the country into complete disorder, and choke off vital services. Rescue, search and evacuation would be top priority assignments, it was suggested, and familiarization with atomic weapons, fall-out and decontamination are "musts" for everyone in the regiment.

Col. Charters touched on the theme of civil defence when he was guest speaker last Friday night at the First Annual Ladies Night of the Sergeant's Mess. On that occasion, he expressed the hope that war would be averted and that the world's diplomats would "exercise the greatest wisdom and diplomacy in maintaining peace."

"It is my unofficial opinion, however, as a private citizen, that a bomb could drop here tomorrow," he said.

Col. Charters gave the officers a resume of the recent exercise which he and his second-in-command, Major A. Kemp of Burlington, recently attended at Halleybury. This was the first exercise involving the militia in which simulated atomic bombing was featured. The lessons learned at Halleybury will be imparted to officers, NCO's and other ranks during the coming training year, and a staff has already been made on the salient aspects.

Certain details of civil defence, particularly involving liaison between the military and civilian authorities is in process of clarification, the CO said.

The natural tendency in time of home-front disaster is "family survival first" it was admitted. It was therefore necessary to develop a plan of operation which would be built on the theme of "Save the Nation." Cooperation, teamwork and above all discipline would be needed to avert chaos.

Col. Charters said that the civil defence programme would also be designed to cope with peacetime disaster such as that created by Hurricane Hazel, as well as war-born calamity.

## Advisory Board Helps 38 County Blind Residents

There are 38 registered blind residents of Halton County, it was reported by Wesley Stanley, field secretary at the annual meeting of Halton Advisory Board of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

The meeting was held in Milton at the office of the chairman, G. Frank Thompson on November 6th. Blind residents range in age from 3 years to 99, Mr. Stanley said pointing out that the CNIB is anxious to extend its services to these persons and can only do so with the help of the board and other interested parties.

Thanks to members of the IODE in Georgetown, Acton and Milton the annual fund campaign was quite successful. Georgetown contributed \$955, Milton \$1301 and Acton \$702. These together with a \$500 county grant and an allotment of \$5500 from the Good Neighbors Fund of Oakville, Trafalgar - Bronte, and proceeds from a campaign now in progress in Burlington, provides the revenue to help blind citizens. There were receipts of \$300 from Blindcraft booths at Milton and Georgetown fairs.

There has been a good response in connection with the "eye bank". Not all blind people can benefit from the transplanting of corneas, but to those who can it means restoration of sight and greatly improved vision.

**WILL SELL MUNICIPAL TELEPHONE SERVICE**  
The municipal telephone system of Chinguacousy Township will be put up for sale, if ratepayers approve a bylaw which is slated to appear on this year's election ballot December 9th.  
All ratepayers qualified to vote on money-by-laws will have the opportunity of voicing their opinion on whether the system should be maintained as a public utility or whether negotiations should be opened for its sale.  
A Bell Telephone Company offer is standing involving approximately \$350,000 for the assets of the municipal system. The capital value is placed by auditors at \$312,000.  
The township is now paying principal and interest on a debenture issue of \$275,000. The debentures were issued for funds to rebuild the line which serves 200 subscribers.  
The municipal system was inaugurated 50 years ago, with a handful of subscribers. It has grown to its present status with assets of more than \$275,000. Three exchanges serve the subscribers, at Huttonville, Snelgrove, and Victoria, serving a large number of people in the Georgetown shopping area, particularly on the Victoria exchange.  
Chinguacousy nominations are to be held Friday, Nov. 29th. Nominations will be held for reeve, deputy-reeve and councillors and the election is slated for December 9. Ratepayers will also voice their opinion on a five year annual grant of \$20,000 for the extension of Peel Memorial Hospital. All electors will answer a question on the two-year term.
