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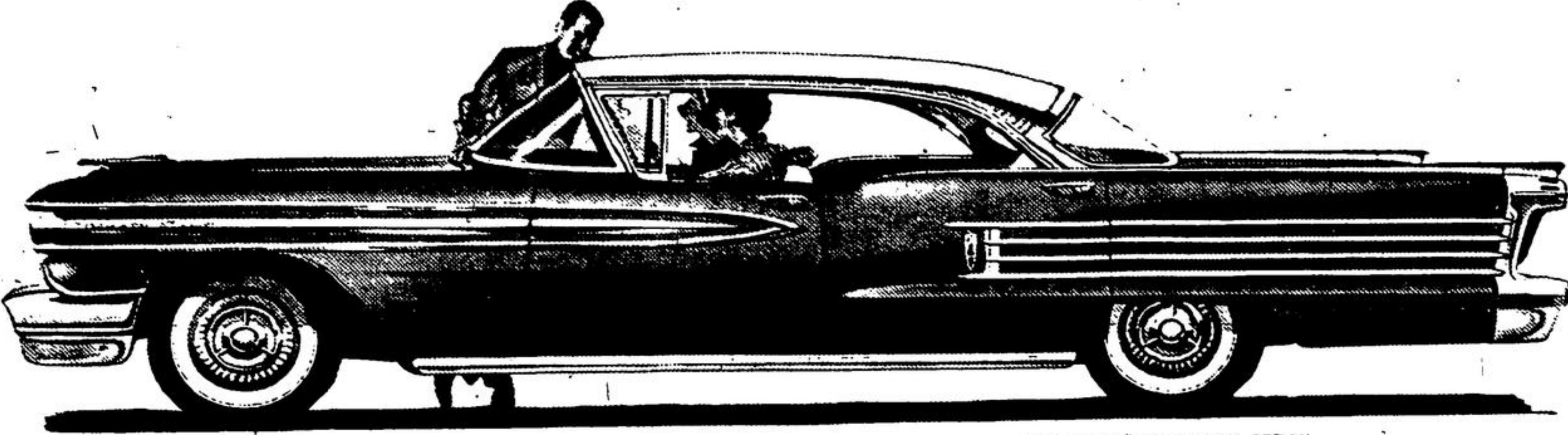
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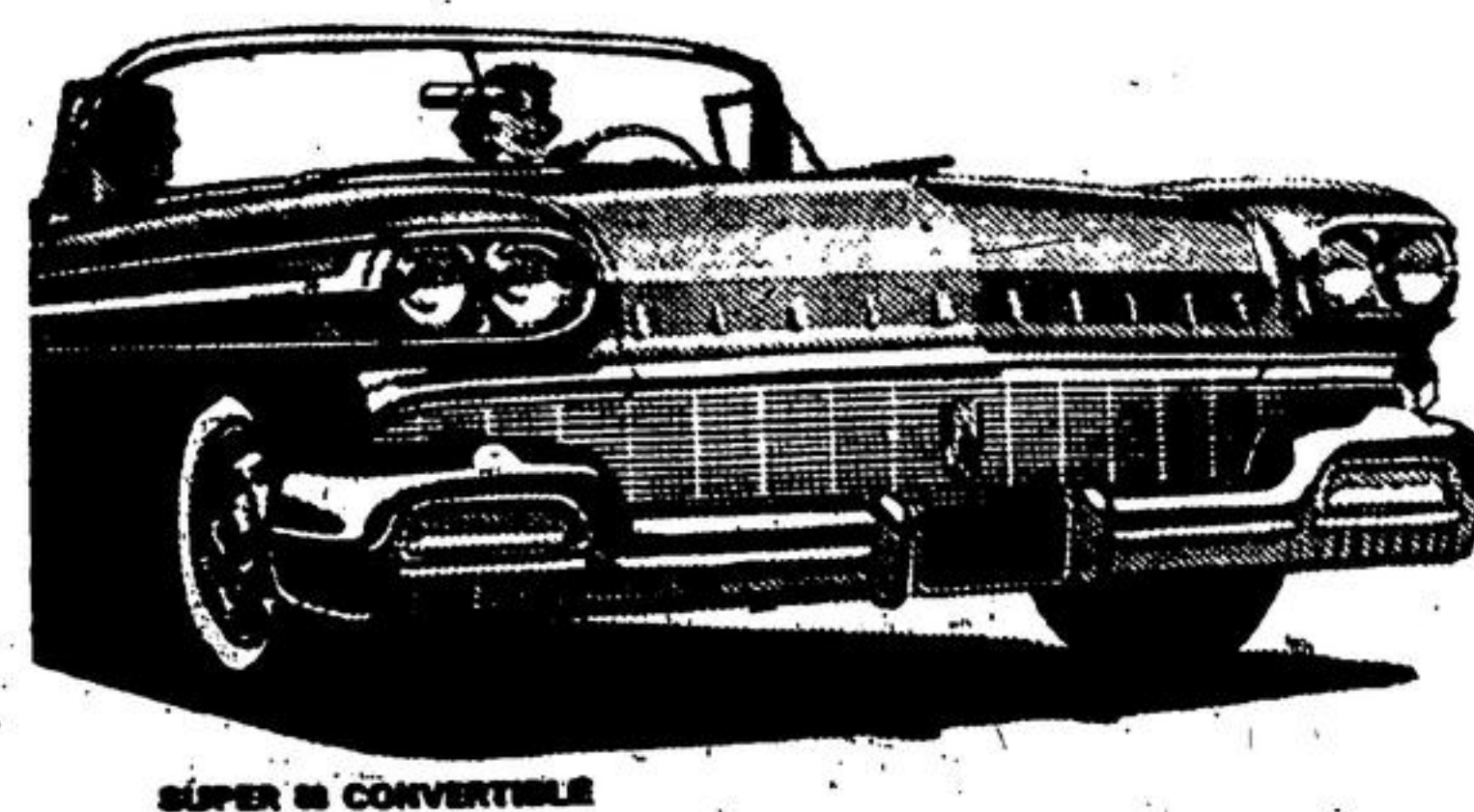
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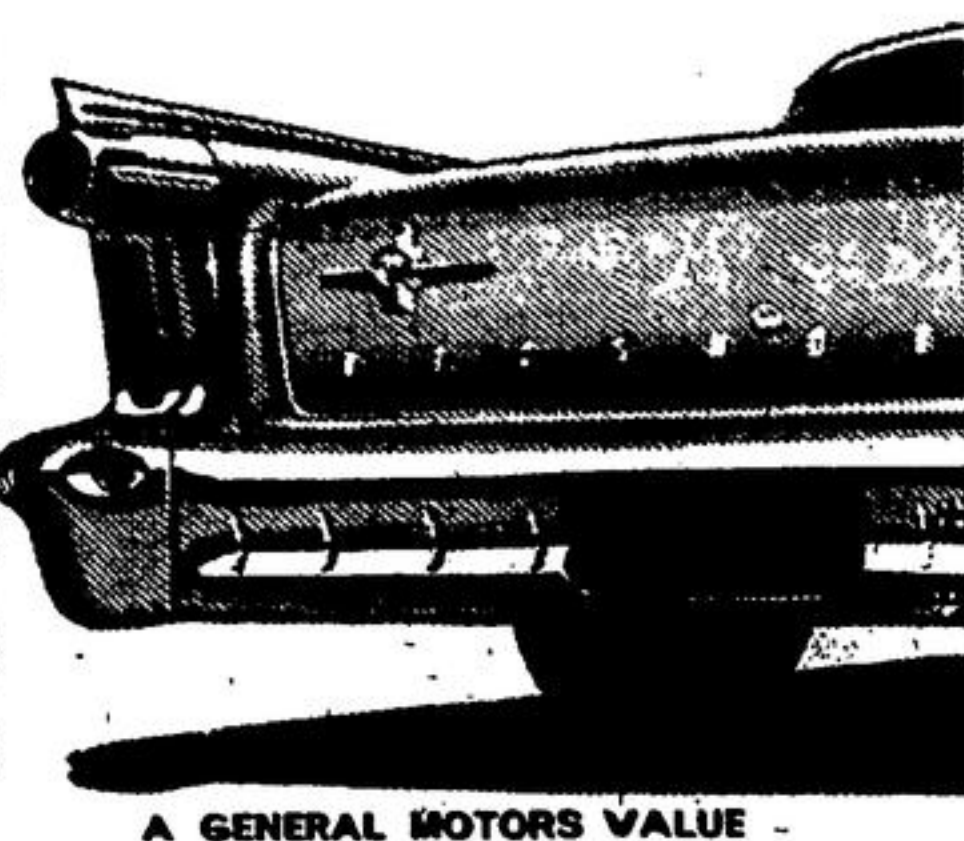

Two other members of the 1958 council are well-known locally, Joseph Hurst, who is a son-in-law of Cr. Harry Hale, and Ben, Rachlin, whose father, the late Isaac Rachlin once operated a dry cleaning plant in town.
