 the town" Mr. Hyde said. "But we can't pass by the fact that 4 years ago we were told by an expert that a 40.80 ratio was all-important and now the same man is saying it is not important, even though the ratio is 19.81 at present." (Mr. Hyde was apparently referring to planning consultant Dr. E. G. Faludi in his remarks.)

Reeve Stan Allen said it is possible to place too much emphasis on ration. What concerns taxpayers is the amount of taxes they pay, he said, and there are places where there is very little industrial assessment, yet taxes are low. The townships are an example, he said.

The reeve said it is possible that while the 40.80 ratio was the yardstick four years ago, conditions can make things obsolete. However, council now has two sets of figures to study, and his mind is made up on what is the best thing for the town to do.

"In opposing or accepting the Delrex proposal, we should make up our minds on the figures submitted and not worry too much about the ratio," was the reeve's opinion.

Cr. Alfred Sykes pointed out that Etobicoke had been faced with a large scale expansion of housing and lack of industry a few years ago, which resulted in terrific capital expenditures and led to an 80 mill tax rate. The township has now reached a 60.40 ratio, he said, and next year, for the first time, anticipates no rise in tax rate.

"We have two briefs," one submitted by a salesman, which is perhaps somewhat optimistic, the other by an auditor, who, by the nature of his work is somewhat of a pessimist," said Mayor Armstrong. "I suggest that councillors take the two briefs and study them carefully in order that we can arrive at the best decision on the problem."

An hour of council time was consumed as a discussion took place with Art Scott on an account for extras to the new fire truck. It was finally decided to pay \$324 for the heavier tires and extra battery which had been put on the truck when it was purchased last year, and which had not been included in the original tender price.
