

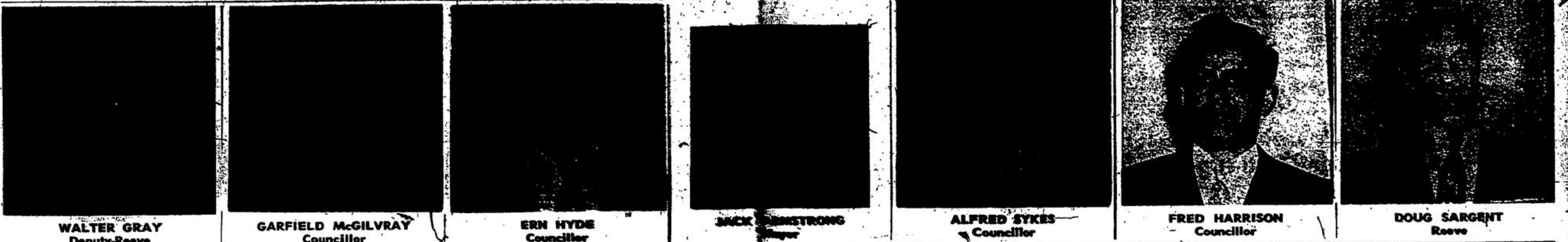

### Playing Coach Joe Schertzl will Boost Raider Ranks

Ranking second only to Bob Goldham in putting this district on the hockey map, former American League hockey star Joe Schertzl is the latest member of the fast expanding Raider player list and will be in the lineup Friday when the Raiders get a return match with the league leading Brampton club. He'll also handle the coaching end of it since Scotty Patterson has been appointed as the new manager.

Joe played 8 years with the Hershey Bears of the AHL and has four years experience with the Kitchener Dutchmen and was a member of the Allan Cup champions in 1954-55. He travelled to Cortina, Italy when the Kitchener Waterloo Dutchmen represented Canada in the winter Olympics but was ineligible to play as a reinstated pro. Canada lost the final game to Russia that year 2-0.

Last season Joe was with Stratford Indians and made the all-star defence for the 3rd year in a row. His home is at R R 1, Norval.

Still packing the defence the Raiders acquired a rearguard from the Toronto mercantile league with Junior A experience this week. Bob Hill played with the Guelph Biltmores and prior to that played around the Junior B loop with Dixie. A few weeks ago Bob was injured while trying out for the Senior B Strathroy Rockets but he's healthy now and will be wearing the red white uniform of the Raiders' Friday night.

Jamie Cunningham and Frank Plashnik are also expected to be back in playing shape within the next ten to 14 days.

Georgetown almost broke out of their slump against the league leaders here last Friday. They scored five times against Brampton but allowed seven, the last one going in to an empty net.

Raiders had a 2-1 edge at the end of the first frame, Dixon and then Blake Inglis getting them off on the right foot before Kennedy cut the lead in half. Brampton took over in the second as McDougald, Woods, Ford and Hunter potted one apiece. Junior Beaumont scored near the end of the period to keep the Raiders within reach of the lead.

After Couch gave Brampton a three goal cushion with his tally after just 24 seconds of the third period, Georgetown put on a rally that almost carried them to win number one. Inglis and Etou put goals back to back to make it 6-5 and set the stage for an extra man attack in the final minute. The play backfired and Brampton tapped in the clincher at 19:50. Hunter got credit for the goal, his 2nd of the night.

Hunter and Kennedy were best for Brampton while Dixon, Blake Inglis and Fred Lawrence stood out for the Raiders. Georgetown drew 8 penalties to Brampton's 5.

#### Councillor Heads Poll In First Try

A 41.8% vote was recorded in Monday's municipal elections in Georgetown, when 1627 of an eligible 3870 voters returned four members of the present council and elected two of six others who were seeking office for the first time.

Newcomer John Gunn, a chemist at Provincial Paper Ltd. headed the polls with a resounding 971, the exact vote secured by 1956 poll-leader Garfield McGilvray. Cr. McGilvray and Cr. Ern Hyde shared second spot, each with 928 votes. Crs. Alfred Sykes and Fred Harrison were in 4th and 6th spots, while John Elliott, who missed in his first bid last year stood fifth.

Only nine votes short of a seat was Mrs. Al Currie, second lady in Georgetown's history to seek a council seat. Jim Emmerson, Roy Warwick and Murray MacDonald followed in the standing.

Mayor Jack Armstrong, Reeve Doug Sargent and Deputy - Reeve Walter Gray had been elected by acclamation a week ago; as were hydro commissioner Edwin Binkley and school trustees Edwin Wilson, Roy Hansen and Harry Shortill.

Monday's vote was the largest numerically ever registered in town. Last year, 1300 voters represented 40% of those eligible. In 1955, 1350 voters represented 50%. It fell far short of the record percentage of 1949, when 1503 voters in a town half the size voted in the polls. In 1951, another record year, a 70% vote was recorded by 1372 voters.

#### Christmas Theme at Home & School Meet

A Christmas theme dominated the meeting of the Home & School association of Chapel Street School on Monday, with the program featuring Christmas music and a talk by Rev. Alfred Barker of First Baptist Church.

Mr. Barker, introduced by the chairman, Mrs. Joe Emmerson, explained how religious instruction is given in the schools by members of the local ministerial association. Some of the children who had taken part in the Kiwanis music festival in Guelph sang their selections under the direction of Kenneth R. Harrison. These included soloists Janet Armstrong and Brad Livingstone; a duet by Pamela Currie and Margaret Murray; and a triple trio Paul Marko, Robert Wigglesworth; Margaret Murray, Mary Evans, David Mackenzie, Jacqueline Shepherd, Vivian Sloan, Gene Rosier, and Andrew DeBoer.
