# Playing Coach Joe Schertzl will Boost Raider Ranks

Ranking second only to Boh Goldham in putting this district on the hockey map, former American League hockey star Joe Schertzl is the latest member of the fast expanding Raider player list and will be in the lineup Friday when the Raiders get a return match with the league leading Brampton club. He'll also handle the coaching end of it since Scotty Patterson has been appointed as the new manager.

Joe played 6 years with the Hershey Bears of the AHL and has four wears experience with the Kitchener Dutchmen and was a member of the Allan Cup champions in 1954-55. He travelled to Cortina, Italy when the Kitchener Waterloo Dutchmen represented Canada in the winter Olympics but was ineligible to play as a reinstated pro. Canada lost the final game to Russia that year 2-0.

Monday's vote was the largest numerically ever registered in town. Last year, 1300 voters represented 40% of those eligible. In 1955, 1350 voters represented 50%. It fell far short of the record percentage of 1949, when 1503 voters in a town half the size went to the polls. In 1951, another record year, a 70% vote was recorded by 1372 voters.
