Question—What are these new N.H.A. regulations we have read about lately?
Answer—The newspapers referred to proposed amendments to the National Housing Act, to enable folks to buy new homes on easier terms.
Question—Is this in effect now?
Answer—Not yet. It is expected shortly.
Question—Will we be able to buy any new home with 10% down?
Answer—No. It is proposed to loan 90% of the Lending Value of a home on an N.H.A. mortgage, however the Selling Price of the home is not necessarily the same as the Lending Value, which is assessed by Central Mortgage & Housing Corporation.
Question—What does this mean in \$\$\$?
Answer—For example, on a home with a Lending Value of \$10,000, the mortgage would be \$9,000, however the Selling Price may be \$12,000 in which case the Down Payment would be \$12,000 minus \$9,000 which is \$3,000.
Question—How about the homes in this area?
Answer—Homes built in this area on fully serviced lots have a high Lending Value, consequently most N.H.A. homes should sell for 10% down.
Question—Perhaps with careful planning a home could be put up to sell for less than 10% down?
Answer—Existing regulations limit the N.H.A. mortgage to 90% of the Sale Price, no matter if the Lending Value is greater than the Sale Price.
Question—I have been prevented from buying a home up to now because I didn't earn enough salary to qualify me for an N.H.A. mortgage. Will the new regulations help me?
Answer—Yes. It is proposed that mortgage payments plus taxes may take up 27% of a buyer's salary. This will be an increase from the existing 23%.
Question—We are back to the old \$\$\$ again!
Answer—Well, a mortgage that now requires a salary of \$4,650 per year, should in future only require a salary of \$3,950 on a 25-year mortgage and as low as \$3,730 on a 30-year mortgage. Also a purchaser has been allowed to put 20% of his wife's salary to make up the requirement.
Question—Give me the dope on typical new home in Georgetown and show me what I can expect?
Answer—On a single detached solid brick bungalow having 3 bedrooms, livingroom, kitchen and dinette, 4-piece tiled bath, automatic modern heating system, etc., with aluminum storm and screens, selling for \$12,300.—
DOWN—\$1,230
MONTHLY—\$66 plus taxes
SALARY REQ.—\$3,820 per year
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Question—I would like to make sure I will be able to get a home. I would not like to get stuck in a situation of shortage of houses and rising prices. What should I do?

Tells Men's Club of Gov't Rehab. Centre
On Monday evening the second meeting of St. John's United Church Men's Club was held. A delicious meal was provided by the Women's Association of the Church.
Dr. Bruce Young, superintendent of the Medical Rehabilitation Centre at Milton was the guest speaker. Accompanying him was a patient who had received serious injury and had been in hospital for nearly two years and is shortly going back to his company again, having received remedial care and surgery that fitted him so that he can be rehabilitated again. Dr. Young stressed that Canada does not want to merely compensate a man for injury received in industry or lumbering but by act of Parliament the responsibility has been placed upon them to make it possible by the best care possible to rehabilitate men back to their homes and into industry. This is done in 80 per cent of the cases. Approximately 3,800 patients are treated each year.
Dr. Young presented a film showing the work of the Centre from the time a patient is injured to the time when he is settled and happy in industry again. The film has won an outstanding award and is exceptionally instructive as to the work of the Centre.
A pleasant time of Carol singing led by Jim Armstrong was enjoyed. At the business meeting plans were made to have meetings regularly on the second Monday of each month and other matters of business were quickly dealt with.
Bob Hamilton chaired the meeting. Fred Ross was thanked for procuring such an able speaker and was asked to invite a guest speaker for the next meeting in January.
