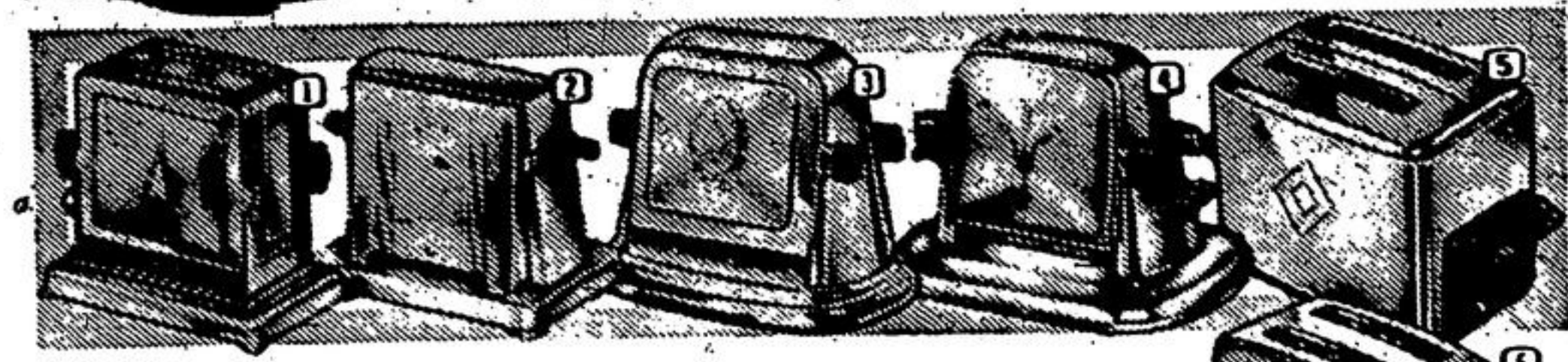

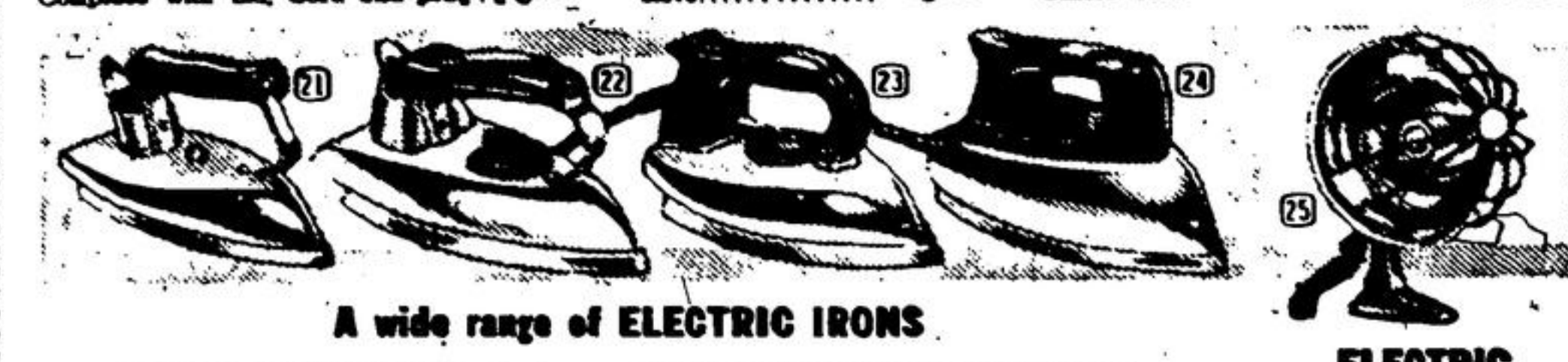

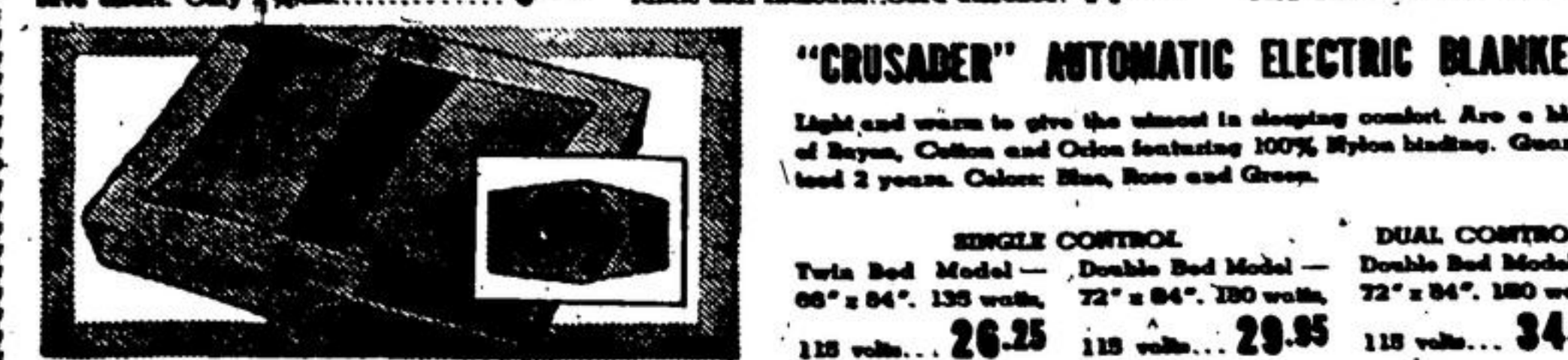

Santa Parade, Speaking Contest Charter Night on Lion Horizon

Tours European Cities for Young Christian Worker

Doug Cocklin, 25-year-old son of Charles Cocklin, manager of the local Brewer's Retail Store, returned home from Europe last month where in his capacity as president of the English speaking Young Christian Workers in Canada he spent three months visiting various assemblies and councils of the YCW.

A Canadian contingent of 170 (35 English speaking and 135 French speaking) Young Christian Workers attended assemblies in Rome, Paris and other great cities on the continent at which 83 countries were represented setting the total attendance at approximately 34,000.

Although the scheduled time for the Canadian group in Europe was 6 weeks, Doug continued to travel and extended his visit to the three full months. Following the initial congress in Rome he left the group when it departed from that city and remained to participate in the first International Council of the YCW. He rejoined the group at Paris and continued with them on the trip through Belgium and across the channel to England.

When his fellow Canadians left for home Doug travelled to Ireland for a brief visit with relatives and then it was back to England and on to Paris. He visited Lauzon in Switzerland, Florence and by October 5th was back in Rome where he represented the Canadian delegation at the 2nd World Congress of the Lay Apostolate.

After eight days he left Rome to spend a week in Germany as guest of the German YCW and on October 20th returned to England to remain with the English YCW until his departure date. His trip back to Canada was aboard the Empress of Scotland on her final voyage.
