Top selling bull at the Shorthorn Sale of Stars at the Royal Winter Fair was Rothney Juggler, consigned by A. R. Cross, Missinagois, Alberta. The purchaser was S. G. Bennett, Georgetown, and the price \$3,100. It is interesting to note that five different breeders were bidding on this popular bull, over the \$2,000 level.
