### Santa Has Candy For All Children

Saturday afternoon will be a big day for district children when Santa Claus makes his annual visit—the 26th such time he has appeared by courtesy of the local Lions Club, with an assist from the firemen.

A parade which will include 18 floats contributed by various industries and organizations will form on Windsor Rd. east of the IGA Store, and will start off at 1.30 down the highway. It will travel to the cenotaph, then down Main St., making a circle on Park St., Market and Church Sts. back to Main. Santa will stop in his sleigh at the bank corner, where he will perform his usual chore of handing out bags of candy to every youngster.

There will be three bands in the parade this year—the Georgetown Brass & Reed Band, the Girls Pipe Band and Brampton Clown Band. Floats will be mainly nursery rhyme characters, and there are trophies being awarded, as there were last year, to the best floats submitted.

To raise funds for Santa's visit, the Lions is conducting the usual lucky draw, with prizes of fowl and a special prize of a doll dressed in dollar bills. The club is hoping for the usual cooperation from the public in buying tickets to help defray costs of Santa's visit.

No effort has been spared to make this a highlight in 26 successful years of the Santa parade. A committee headed by Tom Reed has worked hard planning it, and the parade will be well worth seeing.

### Ontario's Longest-Serving Civil Servant John F. Clark, Guest Speaker at Esqueving Agricultural Society Annual Dinner

"The eyes of the nations of the world are focused on Canada," said John F. Clark, speaking at the annual banquet of the directors of Esqueving Agricultural Society which sponsors Georgetown Fall Fair. Recently returned from a trip which took him around the world, Mr. Clark compared the East with the prosperity of Canada, and said Canada's beauty from coast-to-coast was uncomparable in any country. He said Canada's great natural resources had hardly begun to be explored and a great future lies ahead, he said. He felt that Canada and other countries who produced more food than they could consume or market, should devise some economic method to help feed the millions in the East who are literally starving to death.

Mr. Clark is Ontario's longest-serving civil servant, and was awarded a life membership in the Ontario Public Service Quarter Century Club by Ontario Labor Minister Charles Daley last week. Mr. Clark has been a civil servant for 52 years, being connected to the Horticultural Branch of the Dept. of Agriculture. He was introduced by Stan Hall, M.P.P.

President Spencer Wilson was chairman for a program which followed the delicious turkey dinner catered to by St. Stephen's Guild in their hall at Hornby.
