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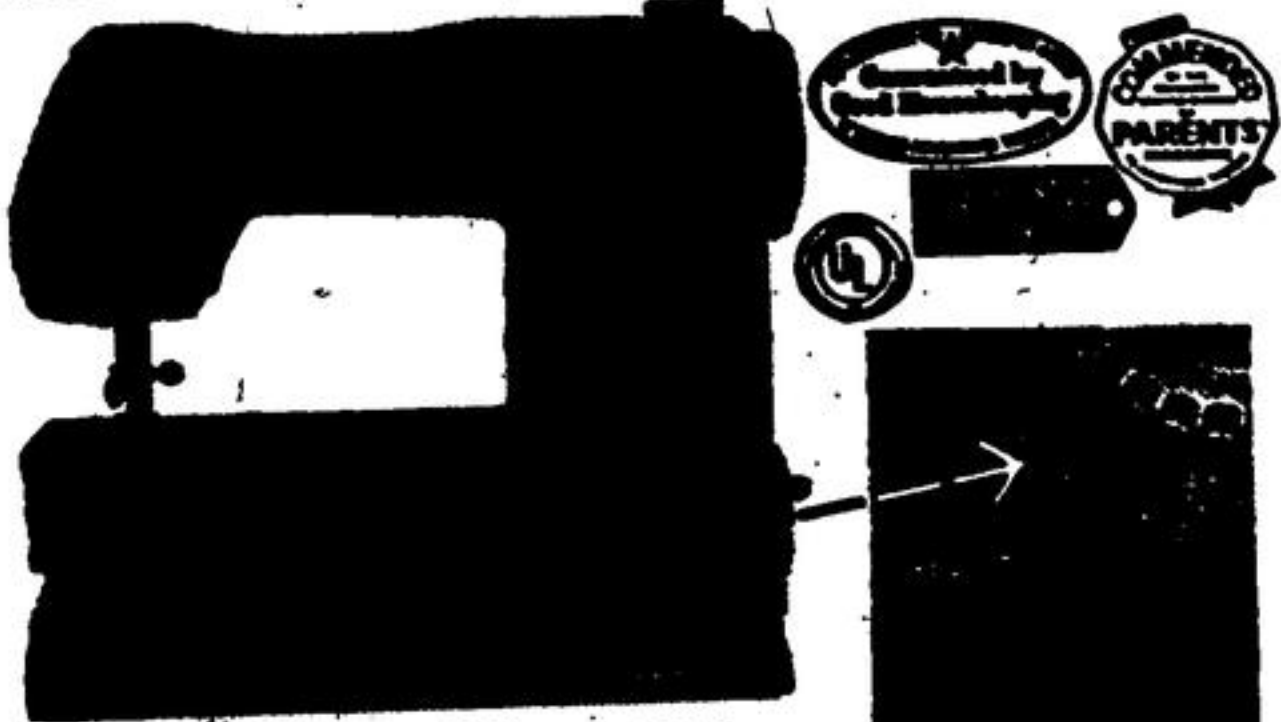

The ceremony started with the regimental parade of the regiment followed by a general inspection by the C/O of Central Command, Brig. Michael Dunn, OBE, assisted by Brig. G. L. Cassidy, DSO, Lt. Col. J. R. Barber, and Lt. Col. Sam Charters.

The March Past was taken by Brig. Dunn and presentation of medals made to members of the unit. A local man CSM Ken Murray received an Efficiency Decoration.

A unique feature was the presentation of a Scottish claymore, by Lt. Col. H. K. Macintosh, MBE, of the 48th Highlanders to their fellow regiment. It was accepted by the C/O with appropriate remarks. The change of command then took place with Col. Kemp receiving the commanding officer's sword from Col. Charters.

He then inspected his new command attended by the retiring colonel. A march past took place with the salute being taken by Col. Charters. The ceremony took place at the auditorium of the Brampton Training School, with the regiment marching to the armoueries. The
