Floats, Clowns, Bands In Memorable Christmas Parade

With twenty floats preceding him, Santa arrived on Saturday for his annual visit in a parade which excelled all previous ones and which would have done credit to a much larger town.

The 26th annual parade, sponsored by the Lions Club, with a generous assist from the firemen, drew large crowds to the downtown area where Santa distributed some 1600 bags of candy, oranges and apples to the throng of children. The parade route along the highway was well lined with spectators too to see the ingenious floats depicting nursery rhyme characters, Xmas scenes and a topical "space ship" touch which topped first prize for Provincial Paper for the second straight year for the papermill.

Other prizewinners were North Halton Builders Association, best in the industrial division for the Three Little Pigs; Harrison Public School for the Pied Piper; and the IGA Supermarket for its handsome entry, drawn by Stan May's four-horse hitch in the commercial class. Zone chairman Graydon Clipperton, Streetsville and deputy district governor Russ Vickers, Burlington and their wives acted as judges.

Other floats, uniform in excellence of design and originality, included: Wigglesworth School, Peter Pumpkin, Brownies, Nativity Scene; Town of Georgetown, Humpty Dumpty; Chamber of Commerce, 3 men in a Tub; Norton Floral and Collett Quikbrik, Humpty Dumpty; Lions Club, Christmas carolers; Chapel Street School, Nativity Scene; Alliance Paper, Peter Pumpkin; St. George's A.Y.P.A., Ephanty of the Snows; Rotary Club, Little Miss Muffet; Legion, Popeye; Hunters & Anglers, Jonah and the Whale. The Lone Ranger and Tonto also appeared on horseback.

Georgetown Girls Pipe Band and the Brampton Clown Band provided music for the paraders, while a group of maporettes from the Vicie Lay dancing school added a gay touch to the parade.

The parade was under the direction of Tom Reed.

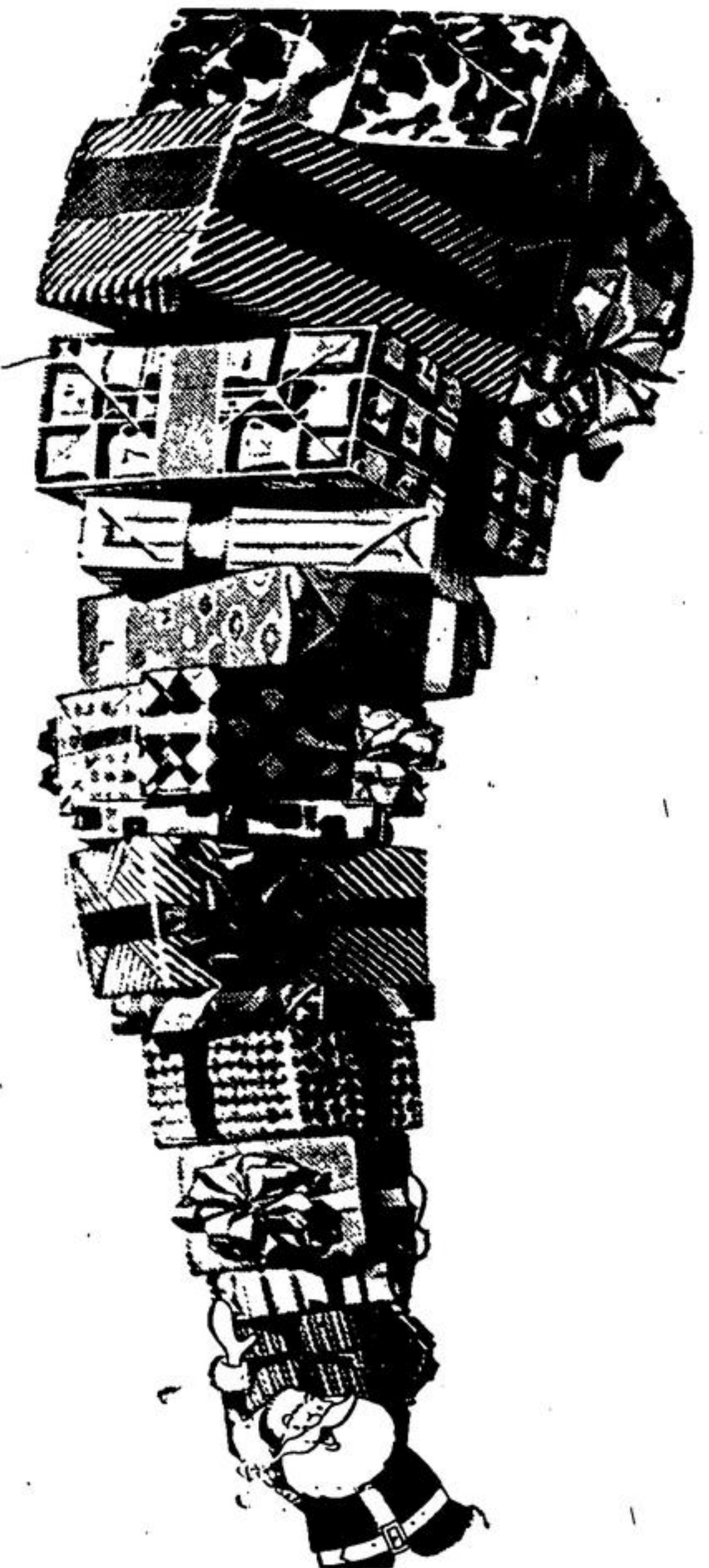
JIM ANDREWS IS NEW ORANGE LODGE MASTER

New Stewarttown School Now Will Be Five Rooms

URBAN BOARD CHRISTMAS PARTY AT HILLTOP LODGE

Members of the councils of the three towns comprising the North Halton Urban Board and their wives and guests held their annual Christmas party at Hilltop Lodge, Erin on Friday evening.

After a delicious turkey dinner, dancing, cards and a friendly social time was the order of the evening. Music was supplied by an Acton orchestra.

Those from town attending included Mayor and Mrs. Jack Armstrong, Reeve and Mrs. Stan Allen, Deputy Reeve and Mrs. Doug Sargent, Crs. So rapid is development in the Georgetown area that a projected new school at Stewarttown has been added to before construction has started.

Recently the board of Esqueping School Area which administers school affairs, awarded a contract for construction of a 3-room school to replace the present arrangement of a 1-room building and portable classroom.

Surveying the situation further, it was found that the school would be over-crowded before its opening date next September. The board has now revised its plans and has received the blessing of the township council to build a 5-room school. Architects Barnett & Rieder are preparing plans for the extra two rooms, and the board is awaiting approval from the Municipal Board and Dept. of Education for its changed plans.

The school will be erected on 3 acres of land purchased from Herb M. Reid on the corner of the 7th Line and No. 15 Sideroad, directly opposite St. John's Anglican Church. Entrance to the building is planned from the sideroad.

Lawn Bowlers Plan Larger Clubhouse

Plans for a new clubhouse were discussed when members of Georgetown Lawn Bowling Club held their annual meeting on Thursday night. Mr. and Mrs. Howard Kentner were hosts to the group at their home on Queen St.

Mr. Kentner, William McDowell and Claude Kentner were named as a committee to draw up a plan for enlarging the building and submit an estimated cost to the club. It is planned to start the work early in the spring.

Last year's officers were re-elected. Norman Icam is president; Dick Licata, vice-president; Walter Gray, secretary-treasurer; Charles Harvey, grounds chairman; Claude Kentner, entertainment chairman; Albert Pattenden, games chairman. The president and secretary are in charge of publicity. The financial report for 1957 was read, showing a substantial balance in the bank.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the club was served lunch by Mrs. Kentner and Mrs. Norman Icam. Members anticipate 1958 as a year of record activity for the club.
