Town Officials to Judge Best Decorated Local Homes

A ballot appears in this edition of the Herald, which a shopper is asked to fill out and drop in a ballot box at either of the two banks. Winning merchant will receive an award of merit, and there is a lucky prize, offered also to a shopper's name drawn from the ballot box.
