USE CAUTION IN HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING, SAYS W.I.

"Stop and think before making those elaborate preparations for Christmas and New Year's entertaining" was the word of caution delivered in a pre-holiday statement by Mrs. Keith Rand, Port Williams, N.S., president of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada.

"All of us during this festive season look forward to having good times with old friends and new," she said, "but those of us who so far have been lucky enough to stay off the traffic fatality list must exercise every caution to keep it that way."

She stressed that lack of alertness was particularly dangerous to drivers, and urged hostesses to keep the safety of their guests in mind when planning festive entertainment this year.

Mrs. Rand suggested a few simple rules to follow to keep this holiday season not only a happy one but a safe one.

1. Keep a variety of tasty snacks on hand such as cheese and crackers, little hot sausages and potato chips. They are easy to serve and add to the enjoyment of the evening.

2. Make sure you have a good supply of non-alcoholic beverages such as fruit and vegetable juices, soft drinks, coffee and hot chocolate for "non drinking" guests.

3. If you serve stronger beverages never press "out for the rear" on a parting guest. Make the farewell drink of the evening a hot cup of coffee. It will help every driver to stay alert and alive.

4. Check your radio for weather reports and if your guests have a long distance to travel persuade them to stay overnight when a storm is predicted.

5. If your friends have any distance to travel through isolated areas, suggest they bring a thermos of coffee to provide a break during the drive. Refill the thermos for them when they leave to provide a break on the way home.
