**Final Period Rally Beats Junior Raiders at Whitby**

**Special Christmas Services in St. George's Anglican Church**

Special services marked Christmas at St. George's Anglican Church, including a morning service on Christmas Day at which the junior choir led the musical service. Mrs. J. R. Williams was organist that morning and Rev. Kenneth Richardson's Christmas message was particularly to the children.

Sunday evening, December 22nd the carol service of the nine lessons was featured for the third year. The organist, Mrs. W. F. Bradley and choir leader, J. L. Lambert directed the choir in a number of familiar carols, with the congregation joining in some. The nativity story was told between carols, with nine members of the church reading this from scripture. Readings were by David Norton, boy chorister; Ellen Blehn, girl chorister; Barry Carr, boy scout; Lynda Arthur, girl guide; Grant Casely, A.Y.P.A.; Paul Kitchener, Sunday school; Ed. Wilson, lay reader; Michael Armstrong, server; and the rector, Rev. Kenneth Richardson.

The service opened with a solo, "O Holy Night," sung by Thomas Warnes. Margaret Eason sang a solo "What Child is This" and the Coventry Carol was sung as a duet by Judy Bonathan and Carolyn Biehn. Also a soloist was Glenna Doherty, whose number was "Gesu Bambino." The junior choir sang "The Rocking Carol."

At the Christmas Eve choral eucharist, Rev. Stephen Coombs of St. Simon's Church, Oakville, assisted Rev. Kenneth Richardson at the service. The church was in candlelight for the traditional service.

Whitby completed their sweep of the home and home series with the Jr. Raiders last Tuesday, Dec. 23rd by shaking off a Georgetown rally and scoring four times in the final period to go on to a 7 to 4 win, before a handful of curious Whitby fans getting their first look at the eighth team in the league.

In marked contrast to the game here the previous Friday, Georgetown played at full strength throughout most of the 60 minutes drawing only four penalties to the five picked up by the Whitby club. Even though Whitby's outshot them in every period the J.R.s were really on the ropes in only one, the first. Right from the opening face-off Whitby took the offensive and fenced Georgetown in behind their own blue line for most of the 20 minutes.

Besides the Jr. Raiders unusual inability to break out of their own zone the only other odd part of the first stanza was the fact that both Whitby tallies came off plays that didn't appear too dangerous. Both Paul Tran's tally from brother Herbie at 3:11 and Rousseau's goal from Keeler and McDonald at 16:30 were fairly long shots that were deflected up into the top of the net off a stick.

A goal by McLean at the four minute mark of the second period was nullified when Pomeroy wandered into the crease. Had the goal counted it would have been the best of the flock, since McLean doked Fielder perfectly with a pinch of stickhandling before poking it behind the bewildered netminder.

Brown got number 3 for Whitby on a solo attempt at 7:30 when he picked up a loose puck at centre went around Sinclair, and then blasted one from about ten feet out that caught the top right hand corner.

At 15:30 the Jr. Raiders got their first counter. Pomeroy netted this one taking Black's relayed pass from McLean, getting away from a hip thrown at him by Simpson and then tapping the puck between Fielder and the right side of the cage. Harrison fed to Richardson for his first of a pair at 17:01 to make it Whitby 3-Georgetown 2 and the yawning crowd started to get interested. The Jr. Raiders went the full second period without seeing the inside of the sin bin.

Whitby rapped in four goals in the last period to preserve their 2nd straight win. Price came close to picking up his first goal of the year when he hit the goal post at 4:50 exactly two minutes before Perry pounced on Jewell's rebound and made it 4 to 2. Price got the assist.

Doug Richardson put Georgetown back in the game with his 2nd tally midway thru' the period. Harrison was also in on this one which flipped in over Fielder's left shoulder. Whitby's brother act, Herb and Paul Tran flanking Doug MacLane on the team's second line teamed up to push whatever ideas the J.R.s had of making a comeback, right out the window. It was Paul Tran from Herb Tran and MacLane at 13:55 and the same trio with MacLane doing the scoring at 14:01.

Westfall deflected in Georgetown's fourth goal. Hyde let the shot go from the blue line. Westfall tried it but it didn't go, but just got enough of it to deflect it by Fielder. MacLane's second marker, from Herb Tran with 53 seconds left in the game was just so much frosting on the Whitby cake. The MacLane - Tran line accounted for four goals and collected 10 points in leading their team to the win. Shots on goal were 1st, G. B. W. 14, 2nd G. B. W. 12; 3rd G. B. W. 12; Total by Georgetown 24, by Whitby 38.
