Three Accidents, 4 Fatalities Heavy Toll for Norval District

Farmer, Truck Driver Train Crash Victims

Three accidents claimed a heavy toll of life in Norval district in a 24-hour period last week-end.

Friday evening, Andy Jensen, 28 and his son Lars, 4 were instantly killed when Mr. Jensen's car skidded into a passenger train at the Norval Station CNR crossing. The family were en route to Brampton in the early evening and planned to pick up the Owe Kjeldsen family who lives across the tracks. Mr. Kjeldsen, who works on the Arthur Clark farm was almost an eye witness, as he stood at the window watching for the Jensens to arrive.

Mrs. Jensen and their daughter Bente 4, are in Peel Memorial Hospital with injuries. The youngster was the most seriously injured and will be in hospital for several weeks.

Twenty months in Canada from his native Denmark, Mr. Jensen was employed at the Clure Dolson farm. The Jensens came here from Innerkip in the Woodstock district, and Mrs. Jensen had been attending the English classes for new Canadians at Georgetown High School.

Besides his wife and daughter, Mr. Jensen leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ebbe Jensen in Denmark. The double funeral service took place at the David A. McClure Funeral Home, Brampton yesterday, with interment in Brampton Cemetery.

A second railway fatality on Saturday at Brampton claimed the life of Harold Ernest Whetham, 26, Norval, when a CPR passenger train and a milk transport collided at a crossing.

The cab and chassis of the truck were sheared off and pushed 400 yards along the track and several windows in the coaches were shattered by flying milk cans. Pinned over an hour to free the accident victims from the wreckage.

Mr. Whetham, who lived in a house on the former Oliver Hunter farm near Norval, leaves his wife, May Clibine, two children Richard and Sandra, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Whetham, Brampton. He was buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton, yesterday following a funeral service in Grace Anglican Church, Milton.

On Sunday in St. Catharines, Russell Keith Nicholson, 24, of Toronto was killed in a motor accident. Elderly son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Nicholson, his mother is the former Iva Harrop of Norval. He leaves his wife, Muriel Fendley, a son Stephen, his parents, and a brother Lorne.

Funeral service was conducted this afternoon at the McKillop Funeral Home, Brampton, with interment in Brampton Cemetery.

Norval district residents have rallied to aid Mrs. Andy Jensen, who lost her husband and young son in a tragic train crash at Norval Station Friday.

Mrs. Jensen and daughter Bente, 4, are still in Brampton hospital, recuperating from injuries suffered in the accident. The young father had no insurance or hospital benefits, and realizing Mrs. Jensen's plight, a group of Norval people met last night at the home of Hartley Cameron and organized the Jensen Assistance Fund.

Rev. G. Lockhart Royal is chairman, Mrs. Hartley Cameron, secretary and Rev. J. E. Maxwell, treasurer. A canvass will be undertaken in the Norval and Georgetown district, and donations may be sent to the treasurer and will also be accepted at the Georgetown Herald office. Generous assistance in organizing has also been extended by a local man Steve Larsen, who arranged with the Danish Canadian Business Men's Club to pay cost of the funeral which took place yesterday in Brampton.

Egbert C. Reed, 70 Artist, Youth Worker

Egbert C. Reed, 70, well-known in art and advertising circles in Toronto and Montreal, and a resident of Norval, died on December 23 at Guelph General Hospital from a heart attack.

Born in Toronto and a graduate of the Ontario College of Art, Mr. Reed has been on the staffs of the McKim and MacLaren advertising agencies in Toronto. More recently he was with Ronald Advertising in Montreal.

As an artist, he was known especially for his many portraits of famous Canadians, some of which were commissioned by the government and exhibited at the Canadian National Exhibition. For a radio series, he painted pictures of mayors of Ontario towns, including then-mayor Harold Cleave of town, and for a later series on the eldest residents, he painted a picture of the late Mrs. Nielsen, mother of a local doctor of chiropractic, which is a prized possession in the Nielsen home. His latest series of portraits of Canadian publishers are presently appearing in daily newspapers.

He was a writer for many years, specializing in juvenile fiction, among which was a series called Adventures of Starr Sterling.

Mr. Reed was interested in work with boys, particularly the underprivileged. With the late T. P. Lohblaw he helped organize what later became the K Clubs of Toronto. Active in the Big Brother movement, he assumed responsibility of convicted in juvenile court and personally guided them into paths of useful citizenship. He also contributed his services to the annual boxing shows of Toronto Newboys welfare fund.

He was a member of the Arts & Letters Club, the Albany Club of Toronto and a member of Kiwanis clubs in Toronto and Montreal. He was at one time chairman of youth activities for Kiwanis for the eastern provinces. He was a life member of the St. George's Society of Toronto.

He leaves his wife, Marion Noble, a daughter Mrs. Harry Bond, Toronto; three sons, King of Toronto and Julian and Laurie, Norval; and a sister, Mary Lucy Reed, Toronto.

The funeral service in Norval United Church on December 26th was conducted by Rev. W. Edgar Gill and Rev. Alex Cowan of Owen Sound, who formerly preached at the church. Following cremation at Toronto Crematorium, an interment service took place in Norval Cemetery on Saturday, with the three Norval ministers, Mr. Gill, Rev. J. E. Maxwell and Rev. G. Lockhart officiating.

Mr. Jenkinson who was thirty-eight years of age was a veteran of the Second World War with approximately four years service in 1948, July 24th and Thomas Merkey were married in Guelph United Church, Toronto, at which time they moved to Georgetown where they have since made their home. He was employed at Federal Sales and Smith & Stone Ltd. for a time and at the time he became ill had been working at Orenda Engines.

Mr. Jenkinson is survived by his wife Thelma and a small son Bobby. He is also survived by his mother Mrs. Horace Jenkinson and two sisters, Frances (Mrs. D. McColl), Mary (Mrs. R. Stodchik) and a brother Frank.

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If the other seven teams in the Super Eight Junior "C" hockey loop could have had a crystal ball back around the first of December they would have been doing everything possible to lure Georgetown's Jr. Raiders into their group at the start of the season. Since the opening game here against Whitby three weeks ago the J.R.s have been dumped by every team they've faced and on paper would appear to be a desperate bunch of low calibre hockey players to be toyed with and scored on when ever the opposition feels the urge.
