A second railway fatality on Saturday at Brampton claimed the life of Harold Ernest Whetham, 26, Norval, when a CPR passenger train and a milk transport collided at a crossing.

The cab and chassis of the truck were sheared off and pushed 400 yards along the track and several windows in the coaches were shattered by flying milk cans. Pinned in the wreckage, it took rescuers over an hour to free the accident victim from the wreckage.
