### Was 42 Years With Cdn. General Electric

After an illness of several months, William Campbell Ure died in Toronto on Friday, December 27th. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, the son of William Campbell Ure and Mary Carswell Ure, and came to Toronto in 1900 where he lived until 1948 at that time coming to Georgetown on his retirement. At that time he and Mrs. Ure moved to 24 Market Street where he remodelled what is known to older residents as the "Matthews Place."

Mr. Ure was with the Canadian General Electric Company for forty-two years, retiring from there as mechanical superintendent. He was also with the Radio Valve Company as production superintendent, and during the war was with Research Enterprises as mechanical superintendent. Mr. Ure was a member of St. John's United Church and a member of the Kiwanis Club.

His wife, Isabelle Woollings Ure survives him as do three sons, William C., Leonard and David, and a daughter Margaret (Mrs. K. Sheppard), and seven grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Morgan McFarlane of St. John's United Church at the Turner and Porter Chapel, 436 Roncesvalles Ave., Toronto. Interment was in Greenwood cemetery, Georgetown.

### Former Arena Manager Prominent Odd Fellow

A gentleman, well known in Georgetown for the past forty seven years, Sam Walker died on Friday, December 27th at his home 20 George Street, after a long illness. He was born on April 14, 1888 at Syston Park, England, son of the late Edward Walker and Selina Gibbitt Walker. One of a family of fourteen he is survived by one brother Jim living in Dorling, Surrey, England.

In 1910 he came to Ashgrove to live with his brother George who was living there at that time. Prior to coming to Canada Mr. Walker was a footman for Princess Hohenlow. His father, Edward Walker, was a coachman for Sir John Thorold for fifty years, the name of Thorold in Ontario was named after this man. In 1912 he married Evelyn London and they made their home on the Norval Road until 1916 at which time they moved into Georgetown. Mr. Walker was well known as a cement contractor until 1941, at which time he took a position in the Brewers' Warehouse, working there until his retirement in 1953.

Mr. Walker was the cement contractor for the Georgetown Memorial Arena when it was built and was manager of the arena for a number of years. He was very active with the Intermediate Hockey Club, being treasurer for a number of years. He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for over twenty-five years and was presented with a twenty-five year jewel in April 1957. He was treasurer of that organization for twenty-five years and when he was presented with his jewel he was also presented with a lay-boy chair and footstool in appreciation of his great service to the lodge.

Mr. Walker leaves his wife Evelyn, a son George and daughter Hazel (Mrs. Ted Arnold) and four grandchildren, Diane and Fred Harrison and Jimmy and Peter Walker. Two daughters Alice (Mrs. Derrick Dodgson) and Bessie (Mrs. Fred Harrison) predeceased him.
