It is sad to compare our own educational system, where teachers struggle manfully against apathy on the part of both students and parents, then shoulder the blame when results are not young charges.

Our whole educational set-up is due for an . overhaul. Three things are urgently needed, and the sooner they happen, the sooner we can ease

The drama of Sputnik has shaken those in our nightmares about the future of the free

We must first-reassess the value of teachers and raise salary rates to a point where teacher is earning more than his student of a few years ago - substantially more. A teacher is worth at least as much as any man who holds a responsible position in industry, yet he all too often trails badly in salary.

Substantial changes in the salary scale would overcome today's serious teacher short age and channel men and women with superior abilities into the teaching fields.

And by every means possible, those who reached commensurate with the ability of their value education must encourage young people to attend school and be diligent when there; must support teachers in any problems that arise; and encourage the teaching profession as we do our sports figures, actors and musicians.

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
