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## LUCKLESS JUNIORS LOSE TO AURORA BEARS 7-2

The Aurora Bears played Georgetown's familiar, forechecking, hard skating brand of hockey Friday night and played it better in rolling over the Junior Raiders 7 to 2 at Aurora.

The J.R.s could do nothing right. Most of their rushes lacked sting and were easily broken up by the Bears. Georgetown's type of play could hardly be tagged positional. The forwards were not bumping into each other were skating in the wrong direction or single file, keeping their game to almost nil. The low number of shots on goal, by Aurora 24 and by Georgetown 22, though surprisingly even, are an indication of the kind of checking game that went on.

The Junior Raiders had their best scoring chances in the first period and even took a one goal lead on Pomeroy's tally at the 7:25 mark. About midway through the session Richardson had a chance to stretch it to 2 when he had an open cage to shoot at from 10 feet out but fanned on it. They came even closer to pay dirt five minutes later, when the puck was tipped to an open corner from a scramble in front of the Bears' net but came to a halt right on the goal line where it was finally smothered by the Aurora goalie, Childs. Just a couple of minutes before that Dance got a breakaway but failed to score.

McKinnon gave Aurora their one all tie at the end of the first period scoring from Davis at 18:10 while Georgetown were playing 4 men to 5.

Sampson, Hodgins, and McKinnon again boosted the lead to three goals before six minutes had gone by in the second period while Georgetown made feeble attempts to break past their own blue line. Bill Richardson playing on a third line with Paul Marshall and Charlie Auger saw daylight at about the 10 minute mark but again Childs was unbeatable.

Harvey made it 5-1 at 13:45 of the second period when his shot from the left boards found an opening between Jewell and the post as Cook picked up his second assist. Hyde notched Georgetown's second counter before the end of the frame on a low drive from a difficult angle that threaded the opening between Childs' skate blades at 17:52 while Egan of Aurora was serving a holding sentence.

Two quick goals at 2:20 and at 2:47 of the finale only tended to fasten Aurora's individual scoring race as the Junior Raiders showed no signs of recovering from the pasting they took in the second stanza. Rutledge and Davis were the marksmen.

Ross Turner and Ronnie McLean had the best luck in staying clear of the Aurora checkers especially when killing off a penalty, and were Georgetown's best on the night while McKinnon, Davis and Egan stood out for the Bears and were doubly dangerous while working on the power play a de-

partment in which the J.R.s were glaringly disorganized.

It was the seventh setback in as many games for the locals who right about now could use some of the magic elixir that was spooned out so freely last season by Dr. Theo Charlton.
