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Council Year Starts Again

Another Georgetown council has been sworn into office and on Thursday night, municipal council business will continue after a few weeks' recess.

As has been the case for many years now, the 1958 council will be faced with important decisions and a plenitude of business and weekly meetings will probably continue as they have for some time.

The year will see continuation of major expenditure on schools, a sewage disposal plant and exploration for a further water supply. With postal delivery on the horizon, it is probable that council will allocate funds for erection of street signs. A program of hard surfacing roads will also be continued, and it is probable that

sidewalks in some of the newer sections of town will be a major item of business.

In his inaugural address, Mayor Armstrong, said that he intends to recommend formation of an industrial commission to concentrate on persuading new industry to locate in town. It is hoped that 1958 may see development in this respect, to balance the extensive house building which has been taking place, and to provide local work sites for a town which is tending to have too large a share of its population elsewhere employed.

It will be an interesting year, we are sure, for council and one which will require the best efforts of all municipal servants in dealing with business important to the taxpayers.

He's the head of a family, who walked into a darkened warehouse the other night and dutifully let the men back in the shadows fire the first shot. It's comforting to know that thousands of Canadians like him have been willing to pin on a badge and agree to make our troubles their careers.

A Great Community Spirit

Organization of the Jensen Assistance Fund is an example of what should happen more often in a community.

The fund, initiated by a group of Norval people to help a young widow, tragically bereaved of husband and son, and left in a new country with a number of debts and her other child hospitalized, will be of double aid. Not only will it contribute in a tangible way to helping Mrs. Jensen during a difficult time, but it will let her know that she is not alone in her sorrow and that people care about their neighbours.

There are many times that a helping hand should be given and is neglected only for lack of someone to start the ball rolling. Misfortune

is not confined to dramatic circumstance. There are often people who are financially blert white by long illnesses, unemployment and less spectacular disasters.

The Mennonites are noted for relief action when someone is in need. Others might well copy them. A dollar here and there is hardly missed by most people, and cumulatively can sometimes be the salvation of someone with whom fate has not dealt too kindly.

Meanwhile, it is good to know that in this one case, a kind providence has sparked some of the good Norval people into starting a fund, and that it is being so well received both there and in Georgetown.
