

Must Spend More Research Money, Says J. A. Carroll

In a thought provoking address, J. A. Carroll, formerly assistant-deputy minister of agriculture for Ontario, and now manager of the Brampton office of the Halton & Peel Trust and Savings Co., delighted his audience at the annual meeting of the Halton Plowmen's Association. In concluding his review of developments in agriculture and otherwise in the past 57 years, Mr. Carroll referred to 1957 as an epic marking year—a year when we broke into another age of space exploration. The depth of the human mind is beyond all conception, he added.

In referring to scientific research, he stated, we must spend more money on research. In Russia, stated Mr. Carroll, one-third of their armed expenditure is on basic research. On the other hand, more money is spent in one year on cosmetics than is being applied to basic research. Here in Canada, he added, we spend less than 5 per cent of our National Income on education and about 20 per cent on automobiles. Notwithstanding the high cost of education, we are today, stated Mr. Carroll, spending a smaller percentage of our provincial income on education than we did back in 1935.
