

## Haltonites See Pearson Elected Liberal Leader

As we left the National Liberal convention hall in Ottawa on Thursday evening last we overheard this remark: "Well, it certainly shows the Liberal party is not dead yet!" and the press reports of the last few days have borne out this fact.  
It was the first time we had ever attended a convention of such magnitude and colour. Two great political leaders were vying for the honour to lead the Liberal party, after the retirement of a great leader for the past nine and a half years in the person of Louis St. Laurent.  
It was evident from the beginning that Lester B. Pearson was the favourite and his campaign committee had deluged the convention hall with banners and placards, like "from east to west Mike's the best" and button-holed every delegate. Paul Martin's supporters were late starters with his favourite publicity "We can win with Martin", and Mr. Martin drew himself closer to the delegates with his fiery campaign speech, but failed to rally sufficient votes.  
While the convention is now history, and seen by many through the eyes of television, only a few highlights are necessary.  
The new leader's acceptance speech was undoubtedly the highlight of the affair. He assured the Canadian people that he would probably make mistakes, "but that whatever he did he would not have to talk back to his constituents."  
We remember the warmth in Paul Martin's address when he said "I too have honour. I have served Canada at the United Nations and as minister of health for many years, and if elected will bring the message of Liberalism to every part of Canada; I will visit every hamlet and cover the countryside from one end of Canada to the other."  
In eulogizing Mr. St. Laurent, who was giving up party leadership Hon. Lionel Chevrier in a terrific address that rocked the hall, said "Louis St. Laurent stands in the shadow of no man, living or dead."  
The reception for the new leader was another highlight, when box lunches and coffee were served to that huge gathering.  
The crowds attending the convention almost flooded us, and we mean this literally, for we stood for the whole show on balloting night, when the great coliseum was packed to the rafters and every available spot in the hall was occupied.  
When there was the social side, too, when a Halton delegate took all the group out to dinner at an exclusive hotel... When the Peel boys entertained the Halton boys till the wee hours of the morning...  
When we met Mr. Pearson in his Chateau suite and talked with his secretary, the well-known Mary Macdonald.  
Had time for a trip through the Parliament Bldgs. and attended an afternoon session... Had to cancel an appointment at the Royal Mint, due to time... Was interviewed on a tape recording for the Oakville radio station... Sympathized with Mrs. Ken Dick when her reservations at the Lord Elgin had been over-booked... They did eventually find accommodation.  
Who were there from Halton? Oh, yes, Mr. and Mrs. Ken Dick and son Ken; George Jackson, Milton Dewart Fleming, Reg. Smith, Rudy Whiting, Pete Waters, Oakville; R. Hennessey, Burlington; Bob Lawson, Jack Lawson, Donald Lindsay, Maurice Manderson and Garfield McGillivray, Georgetown. And from Peel, Bruce Beer, Frank Dolson, "Vic" Vically and others.

## Swearing in Ceremony For 27 Defence Police

(Twenty-seven members of No. 5 Company, Civil Defence Auxiliary Police took their oath of office at a swearing-in ceremony in Knox Church hall here on January 14. Others of the 65 man company, which paraded in full uniform under Sgt. Frank Shannon had been sworn in at a ceremony in Hamilton a year ago.  
Lt.-Col. John R. Barber as co-ordinator, was in charge of the ceremony and Magistrate K. M. Langdon officiated as the men took their pledge to serve. Senior Staff Inspector F. B. Creasy of the provincial police inspected the men and spoke briefly, reminding them that they were joining an organization which had established rules and regulations and which is proud of its reputation for service.  
A police officer is a public servant, he reminded the company, who is paid by the public to see that properties and persons are respected and laws obeyed.  
"I don't mean that a policeman must be 'soft' but you are not given a uniform in order to shove people around either" he said.  
The Halton company is included in a total of 870 men serving as auxiliary police in Ontario, he said, and it is hoped to have many more join.  
Stan Hal, MPP was present with his wife and spoke a few words. Georgetown Brass & Reed Band, directed by Bandmaster Alfred Perrott played several selections. Rev. Kenneth Richardson gave the invocation. Major Jack Adams represented civil defence headquarters, bringing greetings from his department.

## Binoculars, Meat Only Loot in Nine Break-ins

Police were kept busy conducting investigations over the week-end in connection with a rash of break-ins locally in which nine attempts were reported, however, in most cases nothing was taken.  
At approximately 8.10 Saturday night the home of Mrs. E. V. MacCormack, 30 Maple Ave. W. was entered by burglars through a side door, while Mrs. MacCormack was out. The house was ransacked but nothing was reported missing.  
Half an hour later a break-in was reported at the home of E. W. Binkley, 6 Valley View Road. Entry was gained here through a door leading into the house from the garage and in this case a pair of binoculars was the only article taken after the thieves ransacked the entire house.  
The trail of break-ins next led to the home of Mrs. Thomas Hewson, 28 Maple Ave. west, where again the house was ransacked and meat taken from a freezer.  
Police Chief Roy Haley and Cst. Ted Scott set the time of the occurrence at about 9.20 p.m.  
At about 9.50 p.m. thieves entered the home of Charles Austin, 75 Norton Crescent, by reaching through the milk box and unlatching the door from the inside. Mr. Austin reported a quantity of meat stolen from the refrigerator. Just minutes later Ken Porter, of 13 Norton Crescent reported a similar occurrence. Thieves had broken in and ransacked his home taking only meat from the refrigerator. The Porter home was entered by way of a basement window.  
At 10.30 p.m., it was the same thing all over again when police investigated a burglary report from Frank Bishop, 39 Norton Crescent. The house had been ransacked, meat had been taken and the basement window had been kicked in, revealing the source of entry.  
On Sunday, January 19th at 7.15 p.m. Cst. Nelson Trafford surprised burglars in the act of forcing their way into the new B.A. station on the highway at the eastern outskirts of town. Cst. Trafford was making a routine check of the service station when the men fled from the rear of the building in a car.  
Cst. Trafford chased the getaway car through Norval to Sneegrove where it turned south on No. 10 highway and made good its escape in the heavy traffic. A check of the BA station showed that it had not been entered.  
On Monday, January 20th, Stanley Wright, of 31 Edith St., notified the police of a break in at the home of Mrs. W. C. Ure, 24 Market Street. The house had been ransacked but again nothing was taken. An apartment in the Ure home rented by Mrs. Alfred Pond had also been turned upside down by the burglars.  
At 3.45 the home of T. R. Higham, 31 Norton Cresc. was broken into and investigation revealing the usual pattern, basement window knocked in, house ransacked and in this case nothing taken.  
Police believe the break-ins to be the work of professionals since gloves were worn and money seemed to be the object in each instance. Burglar tools had been used where necessary.
