Mrs. Beirnes appeared demonstrating her paper sculpture art for Cinematation Limited with whom she has worked for the past year as an "animator". The paper sculpture art is a new departure in animation films. It will be remembered that Mrs. Beirnes was responsible for the beautiful papier mache exhibit of the coronation at the Canadian National Exhibition in coronation year. The guest spot was only of four minutes duration, but Mrs. Beirnes showed and explained a great deal of her art in that short time.

Chapel Street Home & School meeting on Monday, January 13, was the scene of one of the liveliest meetings to date. Mrs. Eileen Buckner, LRAM, wife of Dr. Robert Buckner, psychiatrist of Acton, spoke on "Music and Movement" a course which she is striving to have incorporated into the School system here. It is already part of the curriculum in Britain where it has proved indispensable in helping children rid themselves of tensions and anxieties. In this way they can concentrate on their subjects much better.

However, since she has seen how this music and movement course can help all children she is working continually for its adoption by the schools.

Mrs. Buckner assisted by Mrs. Roberta Moran demonstrated with fourteen children she brought from Acton, the free movement to music. Sixteen children from Chapel Street School also assisted. In addition she showed a film entitled "Building Children's personality through constructive dancing". The film showed a group of insecure, unhappy children starting this course and at the end of six weeks they were much more confident and relaxed.

Mrs. Buckner and her group appeared on TV from Kitchener on December 30th and since her first appearance was so well received will appear again on February 14. Refreshments were served by the committee at the conclusion of this most interesting evening.
