**JUNIORS BREAK THE JINX WIN BOWMANVILLE GAME**

The Jr. Raiders scored themselves at least one mark in the win column in Bowmanville last Wednesday night by downing the Bowmanville Pontiacs 6 to 3, mainly through some shrewd line juggling by coach Bill Chad. Chad flanked Pomeroy and Richardson on a line with Glen Dunlop, shifting Fred Harrison back on an equally potent trio with Dennis McLean and Paul Ward, to come up with an aggressive attack that should provide lots of company for that one victory before the season is out.

The J. R.s have followed to a T the pattern set earlier in the year by their Senior counterparts, dropping the first seven, making some personnel changes and then on their eighth start looking like a club that won a championship a few short months ago.

Bowmanville outshot Georgetown in both the second and third periods but shooters and weak shots from close in accounted for a big chunk of their total. Lockhurst making his second start in the Georgetown net was sturdy when called on. He only lasted a minute and 55 seconds in his first outing at Alliston when he caught a hard shot just above his left eye.

Harrison, who by now should be qualified to take over the first vice presidency of the union came up with another one of those hat tricks and bounded to the top of the individual scoring heap. Pomeroy with a pair and Dance accounted for the other half of the Georgetown scoring while Fairie, Richards and McBride shared the Pontiacs tally.

The home team took 3:00 on the chin in the first session as the Jr. Raiders ripped six holes in all the advance notices which had been flowing in from Alliston, Whitby, etc. by running up a 4 to 1 lead midway through the period, and then killing a brief Pontiac uprising to hold a 5-2 cushion at the end of the frame. The J.R.s knocked in the only goal in the second stanza, while Bowmanville claimed the third with a tally at 15:05.

Pomeroy's goal from Doug Richardson and Dance at 4:35 with Patton off was equalled a little more than 3 minutes later on a beautiful three-cornered play in which Richards relayed McBride's pass to Bill Fairie who was almost in Lockhart's lap when he let the shot go.

McLean, who is steadily adding confidence to his ability, turned in another fine effort and set up Georgetown's second goal which Harrison flipped into the top of the net over an outstretched Bowmanville goalie at 9:02, the first of three notched by the Jr. Raiders within a minute and 36 seconds.

Pomeroy slapped Richardson's pass from the side into a partially unguarded net at 9:33 when Amstone, Bowmanville's mender of the twine, was making the wrong way. Unsuccessful in carrying the rubber out of their own end the Pontiacs tried to get a whistle and a change of lines by icing it. Coxie knocked the puck down at the blueline and launched a screen shot into the mass of players in front of the net, the drive hit a leg and dropped at the feet of Dance who rifled a header shot into the lower left-hand corner to make it 4-1.

Richards chopped the lead briefly to two, scoring from B. Fairie and Cowling at 11:51, but Harrison threaded the puck thru Amstone's skates from 25 feet out to regain the margin before the end of the period. Miller assisting.

If there was any doubt about Lockhart's eye being completely normal after the rap it took in the Alliston game, it was wiped out after the second period when the Bowmanburgers were held off the score sheet. The J.R. goalie more than once picked off a header shot that seemed headed for what appeared to be an open corner. Georgetown was on the defensive, more by pressure than by design, for the first ten minutes of the session.

Cool thinking was written all over the only scoring play of the period when McLean raised in Ward's pass and slid it along the goal line from past to past where
