ROTARIANS GIVE SILVER TRAY FOR ACHIEVEMENT

It was Rural-Urban Relations night at the Milton Rotary Club on Tuesday evening of last week. Forty farm operators, most of them members of Halton's D.H.I.A. Associations were guests of the Rotarians, at a dinner meeting held in the Legion Hall.

The highlight of the program presided over by president Norman Guild, was the presentation made by Rotarian Ken Marshall, chairman of Rural Urban Relations Committee, of a silver tray to Clarence Ford and Son, of Omagh in recognition of their achievement in making or showing the greatest improvement as measured by D.H.I.A. during the past year. The selection of the top Halton D.H.I.A. member of the year was made by the Farm Economics Branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, and was based on the farm management study which is one of the outstanding features of Ontario's Dairy Herd Improvement Association policy. In our opinion, it was a nice gesture on the part of the Milton Rotarians and certainly those responsible are to be congratulated on their selection of such a worthwhile project.

Superintendent of Provincial Paper coating mill when he retired nine years ago, Raymond Leslie Kercher, 74, died suddenly on January 28th after a heart attack. He had operated a general store in Tottenham since he retired from the mill.

A native of Indiana, he was the son of John and Catharine Huffman Kercher. He attended public and high school in Peru, Indiana, then entered the paper business as a callender operator at Monarch Mills, Kalamazoo, Michigan. He later joined Provincial Paper here, was transferred to Valleyfield, Quebec and returned to Georgetown when the mill there burned down over twenty years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Kercher made their home at 26 Queen St. when they lived here, the house now occupied by the Walter Blehn family. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and an honorary member of Tottenham branch of the Canadian Legion. Mr. Kercher was an ardent hunter and fisherman.

He leaves his wife, the former Elizabeth Costigan; and a sister and brother, Mrs. Bessie May Cover and Homer Wesley Kercher, both of Peru, Indiana.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home here on January 28th and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers, all members of the Provincial staff, were Ross Duncan, Bev Moody, Harry Shortill, Ed. Hall, James Dobbie and Ted Arnold.

Glen Church Shows Large Increase in Finances

The churchwardens reported a large increase in systematic contributions to St. Alban's Anglican Church at the annual vestry meeting which followed an evensong service on January 27th. Contributions to the general fund were in excess of \$4,000 and the building fund, which has been in operation since last June showed receipts in excess of \$4300. It was noted the total receipts for 1955 were only slightly in excess of \$2,000, indicating a vast improvement in enthusiasm and effort over the past three years.

Arthur Beaumont was appointed vestry clerk. In Rev. Kenneth Richardson's report to the vestry he thanked the various church officials and organizations for their efforts during a year marked by a terrific spiritual and material advance. One of the needs for the future, he pointed out, is a parochial teaching and preaching mission. A letter from the diocese regarding parish apportionment and insurance was read. He closed his report by urging the congregation to continue in a strong family spirit moving in one increasing purpose as Christ's flock.

The church school report indicated 70 percent attendance and on the General Board of Religious Education's exams the students marks attained were better than 75 per cent for those writing. The Ladies Guild reported a successful year, with the addition of new dishes for parish use and renovations to the kitchen. In 1958 the major project being considered is stacking chairs and tables for the parish hall.

The Canon Wallace Guild made memorial gifts to the church last year, a new white burse and veil and two cruets which were given in memory of the late Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson. The Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen were in large part responsible for the visitation of Operation Stewardship in preparation

Rotary Midgets Trim High Touted R.C. DeLasalle's

Saturday, January 25th saw the local Rotary Midget hockey team defeat De LaSalle school 4-3. This school is an R.C. school for boys in Toronto and are rated as among the best midget hockey teams in all of Toronto.

De LaSalle opened the scoring at 19:40 mark of the first period by T. Anglin. In the second period the new buildings being contemplated in the late spring. The B.A.C. also sponsor scout-cub activities and purchased the cub colours last year. The scout report revealed 18 on the roll and 27 cubs, while there are 18 girl guides and 28 brownies.

The largest church attendance of the year was that registered when Bishop Bagnall conducted a service of thanksgiving at the conclusion of the stewardship effort.

The rector appointed Douglas Townsend as his churchwarden and the vestry elected George Sargent as people's warden. Lay delegates to synod are Arthur Beaumont and Roland Haines, with substitutes Joseph Eason, Jack Lucas and Henry Lorrman. The parish advisory council will consist of these men as well as John Haines, Harry Tracey, Bob Heaton, Thomas Hill, H. F. Beaumont and William Korzack.

Thomas Haines was elected convener of sidesmen and Henry Lorrman recording secretary. Auditors for 1958 are Arthur Beaumont and William Korzack. During the meeting the apportionment was increased considerably and insurance was raised on the buildings. The Ladies Guild served refreshments after the meeting adjourned.

iod B. Kennedy gave De LaSalle a 2 goal lead at the three minute mark. Georgetown fought hard and outplayed DeLaSalle.
