Moyer Resigns as Attendance Officer

The resignations of Mrs. G. Emmerson as teacher and Harold Moyer as attendance officer were accepted by the North Halton High School District Board on Monday, January 27th when the board met at Acton High School. Mr. Moyer, who was the attendance officer at Georgetown High School, has a long fine record in this capacity and has served the high school in many other ways, at one time being chairman of the board. Mrs. Emmerson who resigned at the end of last year after teaching with the local staff since September has since been replaced by John Calbeck of Dunnville.

A new attendance officer is expected to be named at the next meeting. Thomas Niven, 2 John St. E., was welcomed as Georgetown's extra member to the board at this the first business meeting of the new year. He joins last year's local representatives, Ern Forgrave, 14 Union St.; Jim Goodlet, 8 Edith St. and Fred Masterman, 63 Charles St.

The board was informed by Milton Principal E. Hansen that an additional teacher may be required at his school in the fall to accommodate the increasing enrollment. Mr. Hansen also requested a record player for physical training classes and French dictation. The suggested machine could also be used as a public address system.

Scotch Block Native Victim of Accident

William Humphrey Gillies, Wasaga Beach, brother of J. G. (Goldie) Gillies died suddenly as the result of an accident at Panel Uranium Mines, Elliott Lake. Mr. Gillies, a foreman fitter, and a fellow employee of Universal Plumbing and Heating Limited, Toronto, were found dead on Tuesday, January 28th, beside their portable welding machine in a building owned by the company. It is believed that the two men were electrocuted since their bodies were found "frozen" over the machine. The other workman was James Kelly aged thirty-three of Church Street, Mimico.

Mr. Gillies was born the son of Neil and Elizabeth Humphrey Gillies on the family farm at R. R. 5 Milton, the Scotch Block. He left the farm about thirty years ago and worked at construction work since then and he travelled around the country a great deal in this capacity. He owned and operated the Kirkland Cabins at Wasaga Beach. Mr. Gillies was fifty-seven years old and leaves his wife the former Helen Eng. Jish, three daughters and a son, Betty (Mrs. John Bishop) Hamilton, Mary, Toronto; Bill and Janet at home. A son Robert predeceased him. Two brothers also survive, Goldie R.R. 5 Milton and Bert of Kitchener, as do two grandchildren.

The funeral service was conducted in the United Church in Stayner on Saturday, February 1st at 2 p.m. Interment was in Stayner Cemetery.

Sansford New President Brampton Realtor Board
