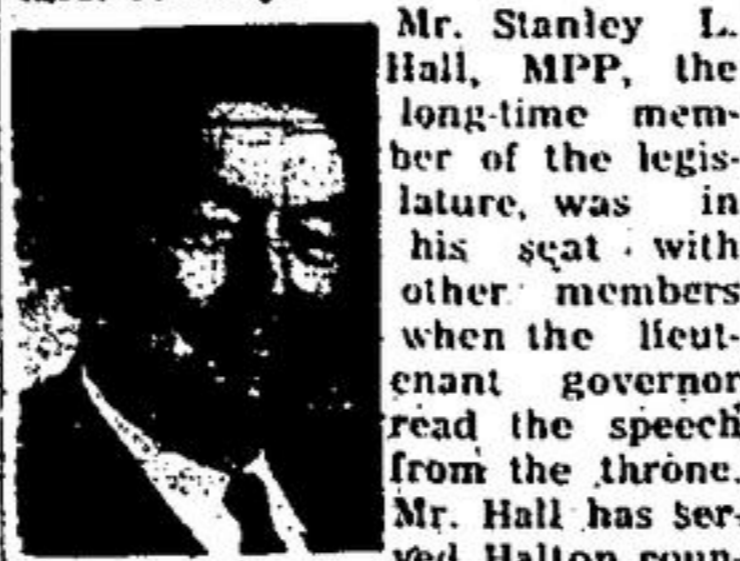
Mr. Robert Crumb suffered a very bad heart attack last Wednesday and has since been confined to the Guelph hospital.

Monday, Feb. 3 saw the opening of the Provincial Parliament in the House of Assembly, Queen's Park, Ottawa.

Present for this historic occasion were heads of the armed services who marched in behind the new Lieutenant Governor, the Hon. Keiller Mackay, DSO, and Mrs. Mackay.



Mr. Stanley L. Hall, M.P., the long-time member of the legislature, was in his seat with other members when the lieutenant governor read the speech from the throne.

Mr. Hall has served Halton county for 15 years, being first elected in 1943. There are only a few members who can point to longer continuous service in parliament.

The Hon. Mr. Mackay in his speech forecast a number of important measures to be dealt with at this session, including hospital aid, greater school grants and various stimulants to aid unemployment. He pointed out that while unemployment had taken an upturn recently, that there was no cause for alarm. Today more people were employed than at any time in history, producing far more than at any time in the past. He forecast stimulus being given to building and the housing industry to take up the slack in the economy. The speech also made note of the introduction of aid in the form of home nurses and nursing services, and aid to existing hospitals and the building of new ones.

Upon the adjournment the lieutenant governor and his wife held a reception in their suite, where they received the hundreds of guests. Assisting them in greeting the guests were Premier and Mrs. Leslie Frost.

**Mrs. J.B. Wallace Widow of Banker**

Mrs. Ethel Wallace, wife of the late J. B. Wallace, died suddenly at the home of her daughter Mrs. Angus Hart, 358 Joicey Avenue, Toronto, on Saturday, February 1. Mr. and Mrs. Wallace and their family lived in Georgetown for several years when Mr. Wallace was manager of the Bank of Montreal, in the building now occupied by the Royal Bank of Canada. They lived on Queen Street in the home now owned by the Bich family.

The Wallace family were members of St. George's Anglican Church, Mr. Wallace being a warden, and the members of the family were very active in the several organizations of the church and the community. Mr. Wallace retired shortly after their moving to Toronto and was quite active in the work of the St. John Ambulance Service.

Mrs. Wallace leaves two daughters, Margaret (Mrs. Angus Hart) Toronto and Jessie (Mrs. Larry Joiner) Burlington. A sister and brother also survive her. Mr. Wallace predeceased her eight years ago.

Funeral service was conducted at the Brown Brothers Funeral Chapel on Monday, February 3rd at 3 p.m. Interment was in Prospect Cemetery.

**1957 Fire Loss was \$2090 in Georgetown**

Fire loss in Georgetown in 1957 was one of the lowest on record, according to figures submitted by Fire Chief Jack Harlow to council recently.

A total of \$2,090 was recorded according to fire department records in a total of 19 local calls received during the year. The township fire area needed the services of firemen on 27 occasions.

**Name Chairmen For Council Committees**

Some changes have been made this year in the various committees of Georgetown council which split the work of civic administration.

Welfare, formerly combined with light and police affairs has been dropped from that committee which is chaired by a new councillor John Elliott. It has now been combined with ambulance and hospital, under the chairmanship of another new councillor John Gunn.

The old fire and veterans affairs committee has been split. Fire department matters come this year within the scope of the industrial and town planning committee with Reeve Doug Sargent retaining chairmanship of this. Veterans affairs has been added to the property committee, headed by Cr. Fred Harrison.

Deputy Reeve Walter Gray continues as road chairman and Cr. Garfield McGilvray continues in his post as finance minister. Cr. Alfred Sykes takes over the public works committee and Cr. Ern Hyde the water committee, which were chaired last year by two councillors who did not seek re-election, Cr. Harry Hale and Reeve Stan Allen.

The administration committee continues to function under chairmanship of Mayor Jack Armstrong, with the reeve, deputy and finance chairman as members.

- Public Works—Sykes, McGilvray, Elliott, Gunn.
- Industrial, Town Planning and Fire—Sargent, Gunn, Sykes, Harrison.
- Welfare, Ambulance and Hospital—Gunn, Elliott, Hyde.
- Administration—Armstrong, Sargent, Gray, McGilvray.
