#### 1957 Fire Loss was \$2090 in Georgetown

Fire loss in Georgetown in 1957 was one of the lowest on record, according to figures submitted by Fire Chief Jack Harlow to council

A total of \$2,090 was recorded according to fire department records in a total of 19 local calls received during the year. The township fire area needed the services of firemen on 27 occasions.

Of local calls 6 were to dwellings; 7 grass fires; one car; one industrial and two false alarms. The other two calls were under the county mutual aid set-up, with Georgetown going once each to Acton and Hillsburgh.

There were 7 barn' fires, 10 grass, 5 dwellings and 5 trucks in the calls answered in the town-

In addition, firemen were called on six other occasions, including twice for aid of people suffering heart attacks, twice in drownings.
