AT ESQUEUSING COUNCIL

Appointments are Made Township Organizations

Appointments to various township boards were made at the January meetings of Esqueusing Township council which took place on January 6th and 20th in the township hall at Stewarttown.

Members of the community hall board this year are: Cra. Walter Linham and Wilfrid Bird representing the township council; Mrs. C. A. Grant, Esqueusing Women's Institute; Mrs. W. Stringer, Ashgrove Women's Institute; Robert Miller, Esqueusing Federation of Agriculture; Gordon Wingfield, Norval Junior Farmers and Harding Price, Esqueusing Agricultural Society.

Deputy Reeve Campbell Sinclair is the township representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, and Cr. Wilfrid Bird on the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority.

Reeve George Currie represented the township on the Milton fire area board; Crs. Wilfrid Bird and George Leslie, Georgetown area; and Deputy Reeve Sinclair and Cr. Walter Linham, Acton area.

R. L. Davidson has been appointed a 3-year member of Esqueusing Planning Board. Four other members continue in office. Edwin Harop, Gordon O. Brown, George Currie and Campbell Sinclair. George C. Brown and Murray Coles were reappointed members of the board of North Halton High School district.

Council has decided this year to revise the procedure of drawing up the voters list. It has formerly been made up in consecutive lots and concessions, but in future will be compiled alphabetically in each ward.

Two claims were paid for sheep destroyed by dogs, the first such occurrence in some time. Meldrum Stark received \$20 for a lamb killed and \$18 for a ewe killed.

Council has approved purchase of an additional 40 feet of land on the southeast side of Churchhill Cemetery, to a depth of 163 1/2 feet.

A debenture issue of \$72,000 is planned for the new public school which will be built at Stewarttown.

Was Ashgrove School Trustee, Church Worker

Rev. J. Bernie Graham, St. Paul's United Church, Milton, conducted the funeral service for Norman Charles Wrigglesworth from his late residence, 246 Pearl Street, Milton, on Thursday, January 30.

Mr. Wrigglesworth died in Milton Private Hospital, on Monday, January 27th at the age of seventy-four. He was born at Lot 8, Con. 8, Esqueusing, the son of Mary Hall Wrigglesworth and John Wrigglesworth and he lived on the home farm until 1942 at which time he moved to Milton and vicinity.

He attended the Ashgrove public school and was a member of Ashgrove United Church and later St. Paul's United Church, Milton. He was a superintendent of the Ashgrove Sunday School for many years and also served on the school board as a trustee many times. He was interested in the advancement of hockey and baseball.

In Milton, March 19th, 1919, he and Cora Pearl Hartley were married. She and their children Mrs. Hořace Barnes (Evelyn) Ashgrove; Mrs. Claude Twiss (Frances) of Campbellville; Mrs. Vernon Grenke (Jean) Brussels; Mrs. Harold Gordon (Mabel) Gilbert, John and Gordon all of Milton, survive him. Their daughter Edith, Mrs. Chester DeForest, predeceased him on December 27th, 1957. A brother Fred Wrigglesworth, lives on R. R. 2, Georgetown. A brother and sister predeceased him Mrs. John Shanks (Ida) Pettapiece, Manitoba, and Gordon of Ogden, Utah.

He also leaves thirteen grandchildren Ann, Fred, Jack and Nora Barnes; Carol and Barbara DeForest; Charles and Douglas Twiss; Linda Coulson; Donna and Howard Wrigglesworth and Kim and Kevin Grenke.

FIREMEN IN ACTON FOR MUTUAL AID CALL

County fire departments used their protective shuttle system again last Sunday night when Milton trucks were called to battle a blaze a mile outside the town towards Lowville at the farm of Lorne and Fred Walker. The Acton firemen were summoned to cover the county town while Georgetown sent a truck to stand by at Acton.

An estimated 12,000 chicks were lost in the fire and a large brooder house was completely destroyed. The total loss was approximately \$50,000.

Two trucks from Trafalgar assisted the two Milton trucks in fighting the flames.

LIBRARY CIRCULATION LAST YEAR WAS 25,063

In an item on the front page of last week's Herald the book circulation of the local Public Library was printed as 2,563.
