DEBT-FREE ST. JOHN'S UNITED INAUGURATES BUILDING FUND

An air of optimism and rejoicing pervaded the annual meeting and dinner of St. John's United Church on January 28th.

Members of the congregation sat down to a bountiful repast served by the Women's Association. Rev. Morgan McFarlane was chairman of the meeting which began with the hymn "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" followed by prayer. Mr. McFarlane expressed his joy and satisfaction in the overall picture of the church last year, and its growth in matters of the spirit and in membership. The treasurer, Claude Kentner, gave an encouraging report of the church finances showing an increase of \$8,000 over the previous year's total. The church's participation in the sector plan of financing had contributed greatly to the financial picture he said. The church is now debt-free for the first time in many years, and a building fund is being established for further extension.

Ernest Forgrave, superintendent of the Sunday School, gave a glowing account of its growth in attendance and activities and paid special tribute to the staff of teachers and officers. Alan Prouse in turn spoke a word of appreciation to Mr. Forgrave for faithful and outstanding leadership.

Mr. McFarlane mentioned the names of members of the congregation who died during the year and conducted a short memorial service in their memory. Mr. Forgrave spoke on behalf of the meeting and moved a vote of appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. McFarlane for their leadership, stating it is a privilege to work with them and their family. A special tribute was paid to Rev. W. C. Murdock who celebrated his 88th birthday this week. He is Mrs. McFarlane's father.

A musical selection by several ladies of the choir and two solos by Mrs. Kelvin Brown added to the enjoyment of the evening. The meeting was especially privileged to have Rev. Allan Forrest, editor of The United Church Observer,

who thrilled his audience with a vivid word picture of his recent trip to mission fields in Africa. Mr. Forrest stated that the hunger and poverty of the masses in most eastern countries is beyond our comprehension. Despite this, he was astonished by the devotion of the people who seem hungry for the fellowship of the church.

Eighty-five percent of all education facilities is provided by missions and many of the leaders got their start in mission schools, he said. Mr. Forrest was impressed by the work of Canadian missionaries in Africa. In leper colonies, though terribly mutilated by the disease, he found the people were happy and thankful for the privilege of healing and deliverance. Thomas Niven thanked the speaker on behalf of the congregation.

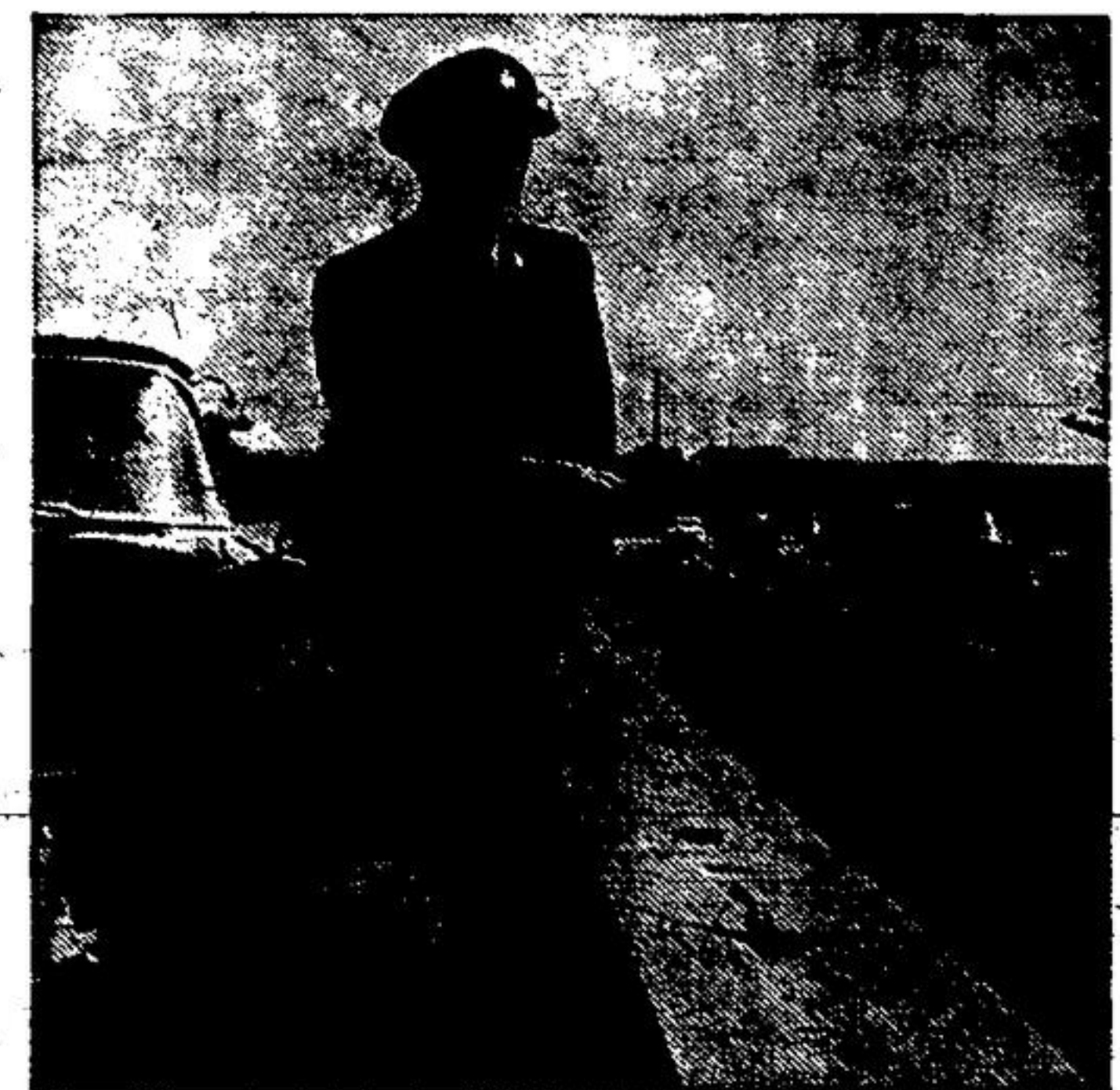
