### Church Funeral Here for Mrs. Andrew Alexander

Rev. Alex Calder conducted a funeral service in Knox Presbyterian Church last Wednesday for Mrs. Andrew G. Alexander, 68, who died on February 2nd at the Lubitz Nursing Home in Listowel. The services followed one at the Harrison-Gibson Funeral Home in Listowel on Tuesday which was conducted by Rev. C. M. Lewis of Atwood Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Alexander was born in Norval March 8th, 1875. She was the former Martha Jane Anthony, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Anthony. She married the late Fred Howes, who was in the hardware business with his brother-in-law, the late Walter Anthony in what is now Thompson's Hardware in town. Moving to Listowel in 1905, Mr. Howes had a hardware and implement business there for many years. Some years after his death she married Andrew Alexander.

A member of Knox Church, Listowel, Mrs. Alexander was an active member in various women's organizations and held a life membership in the Women's Missionary Society. Besides her husband she leaves one son Norman Howes of Toronto and four sisters, Mrs. William Brill (Bertha), Guelph; Mrs. Wilfrid Bessey (Emily), Kitchener; Mrs. Herb Cleave (Josie), 19 Durham St., Georgetown; and Mrs. Harold Bingham (Gertrude), R.R. 4 Georgetown.

Pallbearers were nephews Kyle Bingham, Georgetown; Jack Leslie, Port Huron, Michigan; Joseph Hartley, Milton, and William Potts, Kitchener, and cousins, Rob Cunningham, Norval and Will Cunningham, Georgetown. Mrs. John McClure sang "There is no Night There" during the service. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
