Wilfrid Bird is New President, Fair Board There was only a fair attendance at the annual meeting of the Esquering Agricultural Society sponsors of Georgetown fall fair, when the society met in Esquering Township Hall on Saturday evening, February 1st. Wilfrid Bird, of R. 2 Georgetown, was elected president for 1958, and R. J. Cunningham moved up from 2nd vice to 1st vice-president. Trevor Williams remains as secretary of the board, and P. W. Cleave, who tendered his resignation as treasurer, will remain in that position until his successor is appointed. The financial statement showed that prize money in 1957 amounted to \$3,047.05, plus \$550.00 for races, and gate receipts amounted to \$1,252.00, donations \$710.50, grants \$2,008.00 and memberships and entry fees \$643.00; other receipts brought the total up to \$5,120.60. After deducting all expenses and outstanding accounts, a balance of \$151.46 was shown. A few changes were made in the directorate. Sandy Best, M.P. was made an honorary director, George Johnson and A. E. Waldie were added to the list of directors for the poultry section. Fall fair dates for 1958 were set for Oct. 3rd and 4th, and delegates were appointed to attend the annual convention of Fall Fairs for Ontario in Toronto on Feb. 26th and 27th. District Directors Roy Currie of Milton and Mrs. Frank Chisholm of Hornby were present at the meeting and Mr. Currie presided for the election of officers. Lunch was served at the close.
