One hundred and seventy Lions Club members, their guests and ladies were on hand at the Legion Hall, on Tuesday, February 4 when the local club celebrated their 27th anniversary with a ladies night and a salute to the Old Monarch and the only remaining charter member, Harold C. McClure.

Visiting Lions and their ladies from Brampton, Erin, Streetsville, Credit Valley, Burlington, Oakville and Dixie were welcomed by club president, Dick Riddall. An especially large number was on hand from Dixie, since their meeting is the same night as Georgetown's and was cancelled so that they could journey here for the anniversary. Also attending were Ab Tennant and his wife from the Wexford Club.

A toast to the ladies was proposed by Don Barrager and responded to by Mrs. Clarence Kennedy. The head table was introduced by Clarence Kennedy and included Deputy District Governor and Mrs. Russell Vickers of Burlington, 1st vice president and Mrs. Dick Miller, president and Mrs. Dick Riddall, International Director and Mrs. Bob Cooper of Brampton, zone chairman and Mrs. Graydon Clipperton of Streetsville, secretary of the Canadian Association of Lions Clubs George Winnett of Oakville and Mayor and Mrs. Jack Armstrong.

ALCOHOLISM SPEECH TOPIC AT HOME, SCHOOL MEETING

Dr. J. H. Chamberlain was the guest speaker at the meeting of Wrigglesworth Home & School association held at the school on Monday, Feb. 3rd.

Introduced by Bob McMenemy, Dr. Chamberlain spoke to the members on alcoholism, its effects and causes and accompanied his talk with a March of Medicine film on the subject. He described alcohol as a depressant rather than a stimulant and was used by alcoholics as a relief from fears and tensions. He said that alcoholism is a medical, rather than a moral, problem.

He was thanked at the conclusion of his talk by Jack Runham. The meeting was chaired by vice-president Vic Babey and was attended by some sixty members. Tea and cookies donated by the mothers were served at the close.

### Chooses Private Practice To Full-Time Crown Post

Lloyd D. Dingle, Q.C., Burlington lawyer who has been crown attorney and clerk of the peace in Halton County for nine years is resigning his position on March 31st.

Mr. Dingle, who succeeded W. I. Dick, Milton, in the position, will serve in an advisory capacity for a year to the new attorney to be appointed in his stead.

In a statement issued to the county press this week, Mr. Dingle states:

"Owing to the tremendous increase in population in Halton, legal work has increased to such an extent that it is impossible for me to continue to attend to my duties as crown attorney and carry on my private practice as well."

"The attorney-general," Mr. Dingle continues "has been good enough to ask me to accept a full-time appointment as crown attorney. As this would mean giving up my private practice, which I have carried on for more than thirty years, I have felt obliged to decline this appointment."

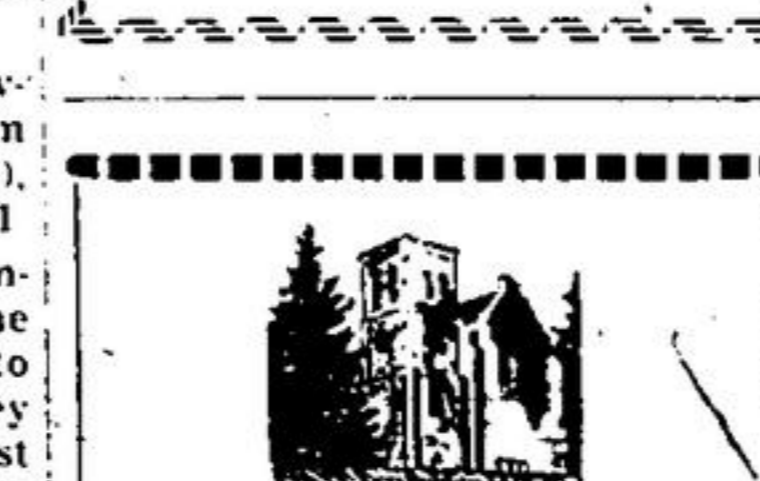

### Pearson Her Choice For Summit Conference

Georgetown, Ontario  
February 3, 1958.

Dear Mr. Editor:

I cannot make a speech. This is not a political plea. It goes far deeper than that and I cannot be still. We are not only electing a prime minister at this time but we are electing the man who will go to that all important Summit Conference, later this year. A conference that may well mean the difference between peace, and yet another war in our time! A conference, at which a cool head, infinite patience and foresight are absolutely essential.

Now let me just give you two incidents (there are many more) to illustrate my point.  
Before June 10th last year Mr. Diefenbaker exclaimed in horror (I heard him) at the so called "flouting" of the rights of parliament and promised to reduce the volume of trade with the United States and cut off, the expanding influence in industry, of American capital.

What did he do? After June 10th before he even called parliament into session he handed over Airforce, Navy and Army over to the supreme command of an American general. How then do we know that this man will do what he says any other time? Is this keeping faith?

Now his final act! An unprecedented performance indeed! He says his position had become "intolerable". Intolerable to whom? The opposition passed every measure he introduced, on an election.

What more did he want? Friends, he wanted to be able to blame the opposition for bringing on an election and he either had to have an election soon or present his budget to the people. He was quite evidently, more afraid of presenting a budget than of causing an election. So we have the spectacle of a prime minister plunging the country into another ten million dollar, unnecessary election at a time when thousands

of men and women are out of work. Ten million dollars would go a long way towards feeding them and their families this winter.

Is this the type of man we want for prime minister?  
Is this the type of man we want to represent Canada at the Summit Conference?  
Is this the man, at whom the other great countries of the world can point and say, "Here is a man who is doing his best for his own country and on whose word we can depend?"

Not a thousand times no! I am a mother, with a son well within military age. I am a grandmother with grandsons for whom my dearest wish is only that they may grow up in a world free from war, as their fathers and grandfathers did not.

Therefore, I call on every wife and mother in Canada to send "Pearson the Peacemaker" to that Summit Conference and let John Diefenbaker go back to his fishing. I thank you.
