Conservation Authority Buys Terra Cotta Playground Site

A 310-acre recreation "paradise" has been purchased by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority in the Terra Cotta district. The Authority ratified committee recommendations at its January meeting in the Peel County Agricultural Board Room in Brampton with Chairman A. M. Greenaway presiding.

Featuring a 25-acre spring-fed man-made lake which in recent summers has attracted thousands of bathers from all over southern Ontario, the beautiful, forested retreat comprises two parcels of land. One approximately 185 acres, was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Leo Wolfe, proprietors and operators of the former Terra Cotta Playground. The remaining land was bought from F. LaVerne Thompson, whose family has held the property since Crown Grant days. Total price of the transaction, spread over three years, is \$110,000. The Etobicoke-Mimico Con-

servation Authority (now incorporated with the Metro Conservation Authority) paid \$207,000 for the 165-acre Heart Lake property some three years ago.

The Terra Cotta property included in addition to the 25-acre lake, two smaller lakes or ponds and a swimming pool. The land is rolling and is covered almost entirely with stands of hardwood and evergreen trees. Two creeks flow through the property and nature trails abound.

The lodge, dance hall and several cottages will remain on the property, and it is intended to be open to the public this season on a limited basis.

Toronto Township Councillor Roy McMillan, newly appointed chairman of the Authority's Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, announced that one of the first projects he would undertake would be the development of this park.

The Authority decided to ask government assistance in the establishment of a highway into the park from Terra Cotta as a winter project to provide employment.

A. M. Greenaway, of Port Credit was given an acclamation for a third term as Authority chairman; A. Wheeler of Erin Township, was reelected vice-chairman and W. Elmer Wright, Port Credit, secretary-treasurer, both by acclamation.

R. R. Parker of Acton was re-appointed chairman of the Flood Control and Pollution Advisory Board, and A. S. Mendell, publisher of the Cooksville-Streetville Review, was named chairman of the Public Relations Advisory Board.

W. M. Curry of Orangeville was re-appointed chairman of the Re-forestation Advisory Board and Alex MacLaren, Georgetown, chairman of the Farm Planning and Land Use Advisory Board.

MANAGEMENT MEETINGS ARE WELL ATTENDED

That the importance of better farm management practices in agriculture is becoming generally recognized was indicated by the attendance and interest shown at the four afternoon meetings recently held under the auspices of the Agricultural Office at Milton. Dr. Harvey Caldwell of the Department of Agricultural Economics at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and John Clark, Toronto, were the special speakers.

A sewer service rate, equal to 50% of a taxpayer's water bill, received approval when a by-law was given its first two readings by council Monday, Feb. 3rd. The rate will come into effect when the new disposal plant is built and will provide maintenance costs for the plant. Capital costs will be paid from the general tax rate.

Cr. Alfred Sykes registered objection to the plan, saying he thought it would be simpler to pay costs from general taxes. The town, with a service rate, he said, is in effect collecting a fee from people renting houses and apartments which should better be included in the rent and paid by the owner.

Mayor Armstrong said he agreed

with Cr. Sykes but that the government would not allow total payment from taxes and council has no other choice than the service rate.

Correspondence was read from the county clerk relaying information from the Attorney General's department in answer to letters

sent by Acton and Burlington councils. The magistrate has no jurisdiction to suspend sentences in highway traffic cases, the letter said. Burlington's recommendation that a deputy magistrate be appointed is not warranted at present, the letter said, and a change of court dates should solve any problem involved.

Expect Jensen Fund To Exceed \$3,000

Over \$1600 has been received to date by the Jensen Assistance Fund, organized to aid Mrs. Andy Jensen whose husband and son were killed in an accident a month ago.

Mrs. Jensen, injured in the accident, is now out of hospital and recuperating at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clure Dolson where her husband was employed. Their little daughter Bente, seriously injured also, is still hospitalized in Brampton, but is making good progress.

An estimated \$1,000 has also been contributed without going directly through the assistance fund, and officials are hopeful that total aid may pass \$3,000 to aid Mrs. Jensen. The committee is anxious to wind up the campaign and is asking that any who still wish to donate, do so within the next week. Donations may be sent directly to Rev. J. E.
