**EMMANUEL STUDENT SPEAKER AT YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE**

An evening service was conducted by the Young Peoples on Sunday when they had as their guest, Mr. Cecil Wittich whose home is at Elora and who is at the present time a student at Emmanuel College. The service featured the singing of many old familiar hymns led by Mr. Neelon and the worship was taken by Miss Beth McEnery and Mr. Delbert Linstead with Ross Shortill leading in the responsive reading. Some very interesting and enlightening coloured slides were shown by Mr. Wittich that he had taken while a student minister at Harrington Harbour, Quebec, near Labrador. He told many of his experiences while there for two summers for four months and had been asked by the people to stay with them for a winter, and the Mission Board had granted this request to him last winter. There is a church membership of 160 with over 300 people connected with the church altogether. They have over 100 children in their Sunday School and an average church attendance of 120. Many of these people, he stated, have to travel by boat and walk for many miles to attend their church services and that despite all the enthusiasm and eagerness of these people, the church board does not have enough ministers available to put a full time worker there. The church has a mission hospital in Harrington Harbour with only one doctor serving in an area of about 600 square miles and a freight boat goes in and out twice a week with sup-

plies. The math industry for the people living there is fishing. Mr. Wittich also preached at the morning services on the charge and gave a wonderful challenge to our young people to enter the full-time service of the church.
