**COUNCIL LEARNS WHAT AN INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION DOES**

**Local Lady's Sister Marries at Aurora**

Aurora United Church was decorated with bridal baskets of fern and white mums, white carnations and white iris, on Saturday, February 8th for the marriage of Sharon Kathleen Knoll, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Knoll, London, to Marvin Edward McClenny, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McClenny of Aurora. Rev. J. F. Morris performed the double ring ceremony and the organist was Mr. Iltyd Harris. Mrs. Donald Watson was vocalist.

**STUDENT TEACHERS AT BLUE MOUNTAIN SCHOOL**

Misses Heather Canning and Arleigh Butterill of Toronto Teachers' College were at Blue Mountain School last week with Mrs. R. Shortill, who teaches at the school.

Initial action towards forming an industrial commission in town was taken recently when council was briefed on the matter by W. A. Wall, of the Trade & Industry Branch, Dept. of Planning & Development. He appeared at a council meeting in answer to a request for information by the town.

Explaining that an industrial commission can be headed by any man, from a volunteer to a full-time paid employee, Mr. Wall said a commission should comprise men representing the town council, Chamber of Commerce and planning board, and suggested a 6-man board as suitable for Georgetown. It is a long-term proposition, he said, and if a commission is set up, it should not be expected to produce results immediately. It should be looked upon as a three-year proposition, he said.

His department, while interested in communities, is primarily concerned with attracting new industry to the province, he said, and it is up to each municipality to sell itself to new prospects. The department has offices in New York, Chicago and London, England and is always glad to supply any information which a town might wish.

Industrial locating is highly competitive, he said. In 1956, for example, 143 new industries located in Ontario, 40% of these in the Toronto metro area. With over 300 municipalities on the look-out, his remark was self-evident.

Besides the obvious factors of tax structure, water supply, transportation, etc. there are such non-rational inducements to industry as a golf course, superior hotel accommodation and recreation facilities, he said, which sometimes swing an industry to a town, and he said a community should publicize these factors as well. Law empowers a town to budget up to one mill of the tax rate for industrial promotion, he said.

He mentioned St. Thomas, Newmarket, Whitby, Oshawa, Kitchener, Galt, Waterloo and Hamilton as some of the communities which have a full or part-time paid man on industrial promotion. Main advantage of a commission, he feels, is that it provides a group which works on a specific idea, rather than mixing it with other duties as is the case when a town council or Chamber of Commerce includes this in its program.

**POTTERY DEMONSTRATION INTERESTS CHURCH LADIES**

Miss Lucy Molesworth, 39 Charles Street, was the honoured guest speaker at the last meeting of the Daughters of St. George's Church held in the Church rooms on Monday, February 17th. The members and their guest enjoyed a pot luck supper at seven o'clock after which Miss Molesworth charmed everyone with her demonstrations and instructions on the modelling of clay. She told her listeners that there are five kinds of clay in and around Georgetown shading from terra cotta to a light buff which she uses along with her own glazes.

She had with her a number of interesting articles she had made as well as several of the tools she used such as a small hand potter's wheel, 100 mesh copper screen used for the sifting of both clay and glaze, several small handtools, some made of wood and some of wire, which were used to fashion the clay into different shapes on the potters wheel. She told how to acquire coloured designs on the pottery by painting in various shades and then covering with a transparent glaze so that both the colour of the pottery and the colour of the design would show thru. Mrs. Thomas Eason introduced the guest and Mrs. John Irwin expressed the thanks of the members and Mrs. Kenneth Richardson presented her with a small gift to further show their appreciation.
