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WHAT COUNCIL DID

OFFER DEBENTURES AT 96 TO MONTREAL BOND FIRM

With only a fraction sold of the town debentures being offered for public purchase, council on Thursday decided to deal with a Montreal bond firm which has offered to buy \$115,000 of the 10-year 6% debentures at 96c on

the dollar. The firm, in its offer, had indicated it would like to be appointed financial agent for the town for a 5-year period, with first chance to buy all future bond issues, but council made no promises in this respect.

LEGION NOTES

It's not often the Legion gets around to honouring one of their deserving comrades, so show your appreciation of his efforts by being there to add your congratulations.

Also at that time the portrait of Col. Cousens will be on display in its place of honour in the lounge room so that members and their wives will be able to see it. It is hoped that the artist will be present and some of the Cousens family.

Cr. Hyde mentioned an incident he had heard about in Glen Williams which required immediate police assistance, and said he believes that local police should be able to use their discretion and answer such calls until the proper police arrive.

He was told by Police Chief Roy Haley, who was present at the meeting, that if such an outside call is received, Georgetown immediately notifies Dundas OPP headquarters, and if it is an emergency Dundas requests Georgetown to go to the scene. A refusal has never been given at any time, to his knowledge, he said, although he has been concerned about whether a town constable is covered by insurance when he is outside the town, for accident or car damage.

Cr. Harrison queried whether, if police had been called, whether they had declined to answer the call, or whether they could not be located. Cr. Hyde said he was unfamiliar with any details and, in fact, did not know whether any call had been made.

"I was police chairman when we put in our radio system and I want to know if it's working or not," said Cr. Harrison, who said it is costing the town \$60 a month for this protection. The police chief was asked to check on the incident.

OAC Professor Gives Tips on Seed Starting

Professor J. Taylor of the Horticultural Department of the OAC at Guelph was guest speaker at the February meeting of the Georgetown Horticultural Society held in the Wrigglesworth School last Wednesday evening, Feb. 19th.

His talk dealt in part with starting seeds indoors and he outlined procedures most likely to ensure success especially when the seeds are small. At the conclusion of his talk Professor Taylor answered numerous questions on the subject and later presented a series of coloured slides showing the outstanding types and varieties of hills, iris, gladioli, tulips and roses.

SAYS PEARSON'S WORLD LEADERSHIP UNQUESTIONED

 Dear Mr. Editor:
 May I just "amuse" your last week's correspondent again for a few moments and refresh his memory a little.

First, what is his definition of "leadership"? My dictionary says "The ability to lead." Not "boss", "lead." And "to lead" means "to go before and show the way." Not drive with a whip, show the way. The office of prime minister does not carry with it the powers of a dictator, it belongs to a public servant with responsibilities to the people.

Now Mr. Pearson's leadership of the Liberal party only began on January 16th of this year. It could hardly be adequately judged in that time. But his "world leadership" has been unquestioned ever since the Suez crisis.

I wonder if the writer remembers? At that time England and France were fighting against Egypt, while the USA was treaty bound to support Egypt. If it had not been for Mr. Pearson's "feeble" leadership, in stopping the shoot-

ing-war, we could easily have been fighting the USA. Where would we have been then with our army, navy and air force under a U.S. command?

You know a foolish and ambitious leader could make any of our allies into enemies overnight. Especially in those countries where there is no parliament or where its rights are ignored.

During World War II we were already all fighting on the same side. And there was long and careful consideration before the step was taken. It was not done without even calling parliament

into session. Mr. Diefenbaker's promises were to lower taxes, raise allowances, etc., and "Balance the Budget." This he has not done. It is easy to spend other people's money, if you do not have to give any accounting. He tried to prove that the Liberals were overtaxing the people. We are still waiting for HIS accounting.
