Richardson Scores Six Goals Juniors Wallop Bowmanville

Brian Vanstone, who eats pucks and rolled into the net. At 12:25 with Keenan off for elbowing Pomeroy made it 6 to 8, Dance assisting and at 18:20 Harrison and McLean teamed up again this time with Harrison on scoring end. Paul Wakely halted the run-way briefly when he beat Lockhurst in the final minute, Lawrence picked up his fourth point on the assist.

Doug Richardson set the pattern for the finale by banging in two goals before the first minute had elapsed, carrying all the way from his own blueline to outguess Vanstone on the first one at 0:45 and capping a three cornered play from dance and Pomeroy 14 seconds later.

Baxter kept it rolling by tapping in Bob McKay's rebound at 3:18. Bob Keenan, Bowmanville's best defenceman for the first two periods was injured on the play and had to be carried off the ice. An ankle injury kept him out for the rest of the game.

Patton's tally from Paul Wakely at the 8 minute mark was the last real offensive effort that the Pontiacs were able to produce and only tended to sharpen the J.R.s for their final flurry, Doug Richardson led the green and white tide as they swamped the opposition with 4 more markers in the remaining eight minutes to run their total into the teens.

Richardson handled Pomeroy's pass like a veteran in counting his fifth of the night at 12:36 and at 17:15 rounded out his half dozen by stick handling right in on goal from the faceoff. He got his assist over Pomeroy's ice hugger that slid over the line from a scramble just 12 seconds later. Baxter put the cap on it with his second goal at 19:48, with Bob McKay assisting.

Georgetown's surprising power Tuesday hinged on a number of points. They had three full lines and five defencemen; their back checking was so efficient that in the second period Bowmanville didn't get a shot at Lockhurst until after eight minutes had gone by; their penalty killing, another department that Doug Richardson excelled in, turned back Bowmanville's best threats; and probably the most important factor, the wingers were taking their passes while on the move, something they failed to do in most of the earlier clashes.

The Pontiacs were minus Lane, Clarke and McBride, and had to go with only two lines. Paul Wakely was easily their best up front while Keenan was their brightest light at the blueline. Even though they didn't break through in a scoring way, Stevenson, and Cowling, also turned in creditable showings.
