HIRE 2 POLICEMEN
Georgetown hired two new policemen Monday.
The men were chosen after interviews with twelve men. The twelve were chosen for interview from 95 applications received. One will replace Cst. Nelson Trafford who has resigned, and the other will increase the local police force to six because of increasing population.
Robert Whitson, R. R. 1 Acton and Kenneth G. Edwards, Scarborough were the men chosen Monday. Both are married men and Mr. Whitson has served seven years with the Chatham police force, while Mr. Edwards was on the North York force for four years.
Cr. Fred Harrison made a spirited protest against policemen being paid for policing the arena in off-duty hours. He said he had been shocked and surprised to find that a five dollar charge has been paid by the arena board and charged back to the hockey club, and that the rate has been boosted to eight dollars.
"The police are on duty 24 hours a day 7 days a week if needed" Mr. Harrison said, and if they are needed when off duty I don't agree with extra pay."
Varied opinions were expressed by other council members.
Cr. McGillivray said it is quite common for other people to pick up a few extra dollars by off-duty work and people can't be too critical if a policeman does it. Cr. Elliott said that if the arena board isn't satisfied they should protest to council.
"When did this practice start?" asked Cr. Harrison. "I've seen the days when you would see the whole police force there just to see a game. I thought our police force was interested in sports with their sponsorship of an athletic association and never dreamed they were being paid to police hockey games."
Chief Roy Haley, who was present at the meeting, and the town force is carrying on a custom which prevailed when Georgetown had provincial police, and he considers an \$8.00 charge fair for an off-duty man who spends from 7.30 till near midnight at the arena. If a duty officer is in the arena he can't be policing the town at the same time, he said, but if council wishes, a change could be made.
In answer to a question from Cr. Harrison, he said arena policing is the only place where any charge is made.
The arena board is running a business and is paying for a service and it would be an extra for the town to use a full-time man there, was Cr. Hyde's opinion.
Summing up the discussion, Mayor Armstrong said that it is the town's duty to provide proper policing at the arena, but since there has been no report from the board that policing is inadequate, he considered the discussion closed unless a councillor wished to make a motion.
"I don't wish to" said Cr. Harrison. "There are three reporters here and I think it will be brought to the public's attention."
